A. W. Lafferty, who has gained more or less fame if not success as a land attorney has announced himself a candidate for congress to succeed W. R. Ellis, of the Second district.

The first official bulletin of the census bureau, issued last week, shows that the population of the city of Washington is 331,069. The population officially recorded in 1900 was 279,718.

The second session of the 61st congress came to a close Saturday night. As is usual there is a wide difference of opinion as to the results obtained, but the record of achievements has greatly strengthened the President with the people generally.

The appropriations made by congress during the present session are the largest in the history of the national legislative body. The present congress appropriated \$108,000,000,000 in round numbers, with which to carry on the work of the nation. This sum is approximately \$36,000,000 more than ever was voted before during one session.

The Bend Bulletin has the following to say relative to the Newell tragedy: "The cold-blooded murder of Walter and Herbert Newell by a shepherd, Ike Harrell, near Lakeview last week, is perhaps the most atrocious crime ever perpetrated in this section of the state. That Harrell ever reached the Lakeview jail alive speaks well for the discipline of the Newell's friends and neighbors."

Ashland has been chosen as the place for the 1911 encampment of the Oregon division of the G. A. R.

Officers have been selected as follows: W. J. R. Beach, post No. 6, Forest Grove, department commander; D. Craig, post No. 14, Astoria, senior vice commander; John Huntington, Lents, Junior vice commander; Dr. J. E. Hall, Portland, medical director; Rev. C. A. Stockwell, Silverton, chaplain. C. A. Williams, of Portland was appointed as adjutant and quartermaster general, which position he has held for a number of years.

Lawyers of Oregon, through the State Bar Association, have declared for a non partisan bench, and are now going to hold an "assembly" to name candidates for Supreme Court Judges. The terms of Justice Thomas A. McBride, F. A. Moore, W. R. King and W. T. Slater will expire at the close of the year, and their successors are to be elected at the general election in November. Of the four men, Justices King and Slater are Democrats. With the exception of Justice Moore, all hold their office by appointment, Justice King and Slater having been appointed when the number of the justices was increased by the legislature of 1909 from three to five, and Justice McBride was appointed when Justice Bean was elevated to the federal bench, thus leaving a vacancy on the supreme bench of the state.
