

TO TAKE OREGON PRODUCTS EAST

Hill System Will Show Outside People What State Holds for Them

Oregon Journal: Home builders are moving to central Oregon in constantly increasing numbers. They are in advance of the thousands preparing to come in a few months by rail.

"They will be able to raise vegetables, fruits and grains," said F. W. Graham, western industrial and immigration agent of the Great Northern Railway company while in Portland yesterday. They will go into this great country, undiscovered possibilities and make it the center of development that will become historic.

President Louis W. Hill of the Great Northern intends that Oregon development should catch up with that of Washington. Let me explain just what it means to Oregon, then the great benefit will be realized. Washington is only 1000 miles as large as Oregon. Oregon's area is 63,127 square miles. But Washington has 1180 miles of railroad with 300,000 population, according to the count of 1908, while Oregon has but 2088 miles of railroad and 550,000 of population according to the count of 1908.

In other words, Washington with only about two thirds of the area has nearly twice as many railroads and consequently nearly double the population that Oregon possesses. Remember please, that this is a contrast between Hill and Harriman development enterprises. Oregon is as good, mile for mile, as Washington. Oregon is as susceptible of road development. It has simply been a question of transportation, and that question will be answered by the completion of the Oregon Trunk. But President Hill does not intend to limit his railroad building to Oregon to the Oregon Trunk.

Mr. Graham has recently completed a journey through central Oregon. His statements were evidence obtained through personal contact with the country. He was gathering specimen products to be used on the Hill train of Oregon exhibits. He will be able to show from interior Oregon splendid specimens of grain, fruits and vegetables. He figures to show that the production would long ago have been wealth bringing had there been any means of transportation.

The exhibition train will begin its journey across the continent, said Mr. Graham, during the early autumn. The car of Oregon exhibits will be taken to all the eastern county seats and wherever the people come together, in order that all may learn what Oregon holds for them. The car will contain between 400 and 500 big jars full of Oregon fruits and fish and grain. In accordance with the plans of President L. W. Hill there are to be compartments representing the various sections.

The area west of the Cascades, the Willamette valley, will be represented impartially with the great central area which Mr. Hill is making just now the scenes of his pet development plans.

For a New Publication

An appropriation of \$175,000 the state is suggested in an initiative petition filed by W. S. O'Ken, of Oregon city, for the maintenance of a state publication entitled "The Oregon Official Gazette." The purpose of this publication is to afford reliable information to the voters of Oregon in relation to the business transacted through the different state offices and institutions.

In event the petition is looked upon with favor by the voters of this state at the general election, it will be incumbent upon the governor to appoint three men of ability to inspect the action of the government official once every two months and report the result of their investigations in the Gazette. The three are to be selected from the state Grange, the Federation of Labor and different commercial clubs, respectively.

It will be the duty of these three correspondents to visit each state institution and gather data of business transactions of the conditions. Out of the \$175,000 appropriation, \$15,000 is to be drawn for the purpose of employing expert accountants to investigate the state's books and report what transpires from months to months. The remainder of the appropriation will be expended for printing the Gazette and paying the three appointed correspondents. To make make up this appropriation Mr. O'Ken suggests that \$1 be taken annually from the state's general fund for every voter.

COUNTY DIVISION VEXED QUESTION

Inclination to Pass General Law to Apply to All Parts of State

The county division bill will not pass unless it meets the approval of the voters, at least on the points that are likely to be raised. 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Creation of any new district is provided for in the proposed law, from municipality to county. When the people of a county want new boundaries, 30 per cent of those affected must also a petition to the governor to that effect. It shall then be the duty of the governor to name the commission of the three disinterested persons, who will be charged with passing on the question, examining all the claims made, property conditions, number of population and other things that would guide determining such a request. If this commission finds that the measure is without merit, it may report adversely, and there the movement ends, except that the petitioners have to pay the expense of securing the commission and for its report. If the commission favors the project the question shall then go to the people of the district or county affected, and be decided by them and have no place before the electors of the state at large.
