and when it comes to size compared with some of the prize exhibits of many a county fair in the east and some on the coast. When it comes to fruit he believes that this section of the state is peculiarly adapted to the growing of the finest fruits produced on the continent if those that he has tried this summer are fair samples of what can be done here in that line. Apples, pears, peaches, apricots, and in their season strawberries, raspberries, loganberries, cherries and gooseberries have been on the market and are good enough for any one. The flavor, size and quality of the fruit that he has seen appeal to him from many standpoints. When he came over here after having spent many years in Klamath County and being fairly conversant with conditions over there, he believed that this was a country where there was much livestock but very little of any thing else. It has been an agreeable surprise and he feels that if the many visitors that go to the Klamath Country could see what there is in this valley to say nothing of some of the other valleys of the county they would not hesitate to get some of the land that is now to be secured at remarkably reasonable prices that prevail or that can be taken under the homestead act as there are some of the best lands in the county still to be secured so he is informed by several reliable men who make this branch of the land business a special study and who are in a position to know. He finds that beyond the O. V. L. project there are a number of smaller projects that could be put through and use some of the water that annually flows into Goose Lake without doing any particular good to any one. There are streams in the north end of the valley that will furnish

water for thousands of acres of land properly numbered and stored. He might also be said about the many smaller streams that flow into Goose Lake or whose waters eventually get there. One thing that he has learned in the course of a private reclamation project over a governmental project. The spend that is used on the part of the private project makes a person blind for the dirt and tape methods that have been used in making the Klamath ditch and a simple example of it is to be found in the values of the O. V. L. projects are found on the land that would be sold without any tax or trouble to the possessor of the valley while the Klamath Government Project has an above course of increasing costs being and in activity with some more substantial ones as much as a \$100,000 per acre. The government is the one that has the whole lot to the detriment of the people that have been waiting so patiently for the necessary water that they expect to see in the private project as shown in this valley. The government is spending thousands of dollars in digging or attempting to drain. This is the case with the Goose Lake. Here Goose Lake is containing about 120,000 acres of alluvial soils that have washed down from the hills for ages. The Lake is very shallow and could be easily drained by building a channel from its lower point to a junction with Pitt River where at the cost of about twenty five cents per acre the greater portion of the shallower lands in the lake bed could be reclaimed and still have a lake containing about forty thousand acres. Just take a pencil and do some figuring for yourself and see that this will mean a whole lot to the people of this valley if the project is ever put through as the land reclaimed will be worth from twenty to fifty dollars per acre and when the railroads are here some of it will be a whole lot higher in price than that. One hundred thousand acres at the lowest price quoted will mean two million dollars for taxable land to say nothing of the improvements and the large population that it will support. Just figure how many 80 acre tracts that this land would give to the people that are land hungry and then realize that such tracts mean several other people beside the entrymen that make application for it. The population of the valley will be increased many times over what it is at present and every acre of this land will help to increase the values of the adjoining lands that are now held by the different settlers. Some day he believes that the people of this part of the state will rise up and make demand that the reclamation project be put through for there seems to be every kind of an argument for it and few against. When it comes to delightful weather he believes that the months he has spent here have been the most pleasant that he has ever seen. We have had few warm days and the nights—Oregon nights—are always cool and restful. The summer has been the driest since the dry seasons of 1887-88 and yet there is good a crop of many of the grains and grasses that he has seen and while there is a general report of a short crop of these products they demonstrate that if this valley can show up this year with a lack of rain it must be a pretty good place when it gets all that it needs and when the residents will not have to depend upon the natural rainfall during the summer but can turn the water on when they get ready and turn it off likewise. There seems to be a general change of conditions in the valley since the fame of the fruit products have gone out and have never been disputed some of the wide awake men of the valley have platted some of the choicest land into fruit tracts and have their own irrigation projects and will water these tracts so that there will never be a scarcity of moisture to the grower. This means there will be many thousands of acres follow the lead of these pioneers in this movement and that when the visitor to the valley comes here in the next ten years he will see the finest fruit country that is to be found anywhere along with the highest class vegetables and farm products. He notices that considerable capital could be used in developing some of the needs of the country. There is room for men with large or small amounts in various lines. The man that comes to see the need of the place for his particular line is the one that will come with the money to go ahead and develop what he has found. Goose Lake Valley, Lake County, Oregon is a good place for him and he feels that when more people see it and find the many advantages that it possesses and the few disadvantages to be found here there will be a large number of people coming here to see what we have and who will remain.

From the reports of the men that have wood in the hills and those that are hauling it to market there is no doubt to be a shortage of fuel the coming winter unless a great deal more wood is brought in before the rains make the roads impassable the coming fall. The price is high enough at present.
