APPLE CROP BETTER

(Continued from page 1)

The crop this year promises to be above 40 per cent in excess of last year.

In the southern group the important state of Virginia shows a decided increase over last year with considerable increase in West Virginia and Kentucky, Maryland alone showing a decrease in this group. This group shows an increase of fully 50 per cent over a year ago.

Canada not including the province of Nova Scotia shows a decline of 30 per cent over a year ago, early varieties promising relatively better than winter varieties. The Nova Scotia district promised good crops until recently but a very heavy drop followed shortly after settling time and present prospects are for a light crop poor quality and not to exceed 40 per cent of a year ago in quantity. Mr. Rothwell closes his report with these words: "If present prospects are maintained until harvest time our country will have plenty of apples all of better than average quality which will have a good outlet at moderate prices to the consuming public."

Contest for Schools

To stimulate an interest in the various forms of plant life native to Lake County, W. Roche Pick, of Lakeview will give a prize of \$15 to the Public School Pupils of Lake County that complete a list showing the highest number of names of the various plants that grow in this county or are capable of being grown here. The prize will be divided into \$10 for the pupil having the greatest number of specimens properly named, both common and botanical, and \$5 prize to the pupil having the second best list. The judges of the contest will be empowered to judge from three standpoints: First; the matter of the number of specimens properly named; Second; whether common or botanical; Third; the language, neatness and general arrangement of the papers.

Every form of plant life will be proper and such things that grow in the county as vegetables and the different varieties of each vegetable, the various specimens of fruits and their varieties, the flowers of the garden and the native wild flowers that grow on the hills or in the valley of the county, the various shrubs whether cultivated or found in their wild state the different grasses and grains whether wild or tame and every variety of weed and also all native medicinal plants should be included. Lake County abounds in these various forms of plant life, some are used daily by man while the proper use of many are as yet unknown. Each has some part to play in the great system of the universe and a familiarity with these plants and their names will some day assist to bring forth clearly their use. Many of them will show people that Lake County is capable of growing a great number of plants that are not generally known to the man that glances casually over some particular section of the country to the exclusion of others. It will make those that are familiar with the country and what it does produce, sit up and take notice when we find that some school boy could be able to show us that there are many things beneath

the glorious sky of Lake County which we did not dream of.

The preparation of the papers can be classified under heads as follows: Apples—Inter Banana, Newtown, Yellow Newtown, or Newtown Pippin, Jonathan, Ben Davis, Glat, Mundil, King, Red, Red, Glorious, etc.

Pears—Anjou, Bartlett, Conice, etc.

Cherries—Black Republican, Queen Anne, etc.

Trees—Yellow Western Pine, Red Yellow Douglas Fir Sugar Pine, etc.

Vegetables—Cabbage—White, Pick's favorite, Pascal, Golden Heart, etc.

Cabbages—Early Waltham, Late Dutch, etc.

Rutish—French table water, etc. There are hundreds of other varieties of trees, plants, shrubs, etc., that are eligible to this contest which will be discovered by the pupil from each section of the county and those from one valley will be able to find many specimens in it that are not found in other neighborhoods.

No pupil should be discouraged at first as there is time for a thorough knowledge of these plants that are indigenous to Lake County if they will take the time to thoroughly look the ground over. Every field, every hill, all the valleys, and each piece of woodland have some secret that they will impart to the searcher after the truth. This is a duty that every boy and girl owes to himself or herself and to Lake County. Not one of the pupils of any school can afford to rest without thoroughly searching every recess of the neighborhood in which they live for every plant that may be of educational benefit to each resident of the county.

Dr. Bernard Daly who has shown in the past that he is many years in advance of the educators generally through out the county, has been named to act as chairman of the committee that will have the awarding of the prizes. His splendid efforts will be assisted by those of Arthur W. Orton and Leslie Seager both of whom are in close sympathy with any movement that will have the betterment of the schools of the county and the knowledge of the pupils in general. This committee will carefully look over the specimens shown and render a decision that insures absolute fairness to every pupil competing. The list of varieties and specimens with their names must be filed with the committee between October 15th and October 30th and as soon after the latter date as possible the awards will be made. All pupils desiring to compete for these prizes will send in their lists with the specimens to the chairman of the committee, Dr. Bernard Daly at Lakeview.
