## BOURNE TALKS ON OREGON'S SYSTEM

United States Senator Jonathan Bourne Jr., of Oregon delivered an address in the main auditorium of the Commercial Club in Seattle before an audience filling every available seat in the large hall, taking for his subject the initiative, referendum and primary laws of Oregon. He was introduced by President Charles R. Case, of the Washington State Federation of Labor and spoke under the auspices of the Direct Legislation League of the State of Washington.

Senator Bourne asserted that where the initiative and referendum and direct primary are not in force, legislation is largely controlled by special interests and public servants represent political bosses to whom they are under obligation for their nominations. Bosses represent campaign contributors. Government can be made truly representative, he believes only by the adoption of the initiative and referendum, the direct primary and the corrupt practices act, thus relieving all public servants from obligation to political bosses and making them accountable directly to the people.

Speaking of the initiative and referendum in particular, he said that the exercise of the power of direct legislation develops a sense of responsibility among the people, was means of popular education on public questions, elevated the Legislature by compelling the law makers to view questions of legislation from a standpoint of the people protected property and business interests from blackmailing bills introduced by corrupt legislators, and protected the people from grants of special privileges to corrupt interests.

He said that the experiences of Oregon conclusively demonstrated that the people can and will vote intelligently upon measures submitted to them. Legislatures, he said, have several times made mistakes so serious that it was necessary to call special session to correct errors of the people.

Senator Bourne explained the Oregon Direct Primary system under which three United States Senators have been elected by the people and elected by the legislature in accordance with the provisions of what is known as Statement Number 1. He declared that he believed of George E. Then, as years go by there are broods of children and they will never be Canadians. But there has been a cause for this all. Our country offered to those people more inducements than their own country could, and so they came away. It is different with those who leave Iowa and Nebraska, and the Dakotas and Wisconsin for the north. They could do better by coming west, and it should be a pleasure as well as a duty for our people to supply the data to prove that fact. They can work here, out of doors every day in the year without discomfort. They can raise from five acres here that will bring them more than they can clear from twenty times five acres in Canada. They can have advantages here for themselves and their wives and children which they can never have in the north. They are chasing the arctic phantom and should be coaxed away from it.

## COMPTROLLER OF TREASURY HAS LARGE POWER

A money can be paid out of the government treasury unless the expenditure is clearly authorized by law and strict compliance with the law results in some very small items being run through very ponderous machinery. Trifling differences arising from travelling expenses, extra time of the purchase of supplies often pass through various stages until they reach the highest authority in the government, the controller of the treasury. This applies to all except the revenue of the post-office department. The comptroller is the boss of the auditors of whom the treasury has to pass upon the accounts of each department, and from his decision there is no appeal. Neither the secretary of the treasury nor the president has authority to order him to change a decision nor can they take any matter under his jurisdiction out of his hands. The only thing that can be done by the heads of the government to change the situation in case they do not like a comptroller or his decisions is to remove him and bring in another man.

An old and revered tradition in the treasury building is that some thirty years ago the secretary of the treasury and the president desired to make a certain use of a part of the fund. It was a necessary and proper expenditure, according to the best standards of public welfare and good government, but it was not specially authorized by law. Congress no doubt, would cheerfully have made the appropriation had the matter been brought to its attention, but congress was not in session when the need arose and the immediate use of the money was a necessity. The question was brought to the attention of the comptroller informally and he gave notice that if it was submitted to him for decision he would rule in the negative. Every possible argument was used to change his views, but he would not be swayed from his settled judgement. When there seemed to be no way out of the difficulty a happy solution dawned upon those who wanted the money. It was to convince the comptroller that his health was somewhat impaired and that a vacation for a month would be to his physical advantage and to the benefit of the government in the renewed strength he would bring to his duties. The arrangement was pleasing to the comptroller, and he sallied forth in search of health and recreation. A substitute was appointed to serve in his absence, and it happened that the new man held an opinion regarding the question in deadlock opposite to the views of the regular comptroller. He rendered a decision accordingly.

An acting judge advocate of the army is a dignitary of large powers, but a case came up recently wherein he was overruled by the comptroller. A member of the hospital corps at Fort Bliss was condemned by a court martial to a pay fine of \$75 the money to be extracted from three months pay. There were some complicated questions involved that appealed to the advocate general's office, and the officer acting the time decided that \$6 should be refunded to the soldier. The officer who collected the fine, appealed to the comptroller, whose decision was that the soldier was entitled to no rebate and he received none.

Oregon's hop crop promises to be generous, with first class quality. The yield is now being gathered and great care is taken in the picking to get a crop clean of leaves and stems that will bring the usual good figure that Oregon hops command in the world's market.

Oregon fruit has scored another triumph, Hood River fruit growers having just made what is believed to be the biggest sale of fancy apples on record. The New York commission firm of Steinhardt and Kelly has closed for practically all the fancy apples grown in the Hood River district, the purchase amounting to between 250,000 and 300,000 boxes, or over 400 car loads.
