### TO THE REPUBLICAN ELECTORS OF LAKE CO.

As it will be impossible for me to come and visit you before the primary election to be held Sept. 24, 1910, and as I believe that you desire to know where I stand on important matters affecting the welfare of the people of the First Congressional District as well as those of the state and nation as a whole, I will state just how I stand upon important matters affecting the welfare of the people and if this declaration of the principles for which I stand meets with your approval I shall thank you for your support to assist in my nomination and election.

I am opposed to the re-election of Joseph Cannon as speaker of the House of Representatives and of any other man holding views of parliamentary organization similar to his. Cannon stands for special privileges and against popular government. The fact that W. C. Hawley, the present incumbent, supported the speaker and claims to be a "Whip" of the house thus supporting on every occasion his iron clad policies, seems to make it necessary for some other Republican to succeed him that Oregon may not be misrepresented in congress.

I am against the "Assembly" plan of nominating candidates, it being foreign to the spirit of the direct primary law.

I believe in the direct primary law, the initiative and referendum, the corrupt practices act, and Statement One, the latter being the method whereby we come the nearest to electing U. S. Senators by popular vote of the people.

In submitting my candidacy to the people for their consideration, it is proper that I should offer a brief statement of my life: Am 48 years of age and have lived in Oregon 35 years; elected county clerk of Polk Co. in 1892 and re-elected in 1894; elected to the state senate from Polk Co. in 1896, and re-elected in 1900; in the state senate, in 1897, I introduced the first corrupt practices act; secured the enactment of a law prohibiting the circulation of obscene literature and books exploiting the deeds of highwaymen and outlaws; also the enactment of a law prohibiting the maintenance of a saloon within 300 feet of a school house; voted for the initiative and referendum amendment to the constitution of the state in 1901 because the people had a right to have an opportunity to approve or reject it; secured an amendment to the law in 1903 making the interest on school fund loans 6 per cent, which established six per cent as the legal rate of interest; one of the pioneers in the legislature for eight years in the effort to reform the abuses of the state printer's office; was chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the special session of the senate in 1898, and, as such assisted in controlling the appropriations as to make this the most economical session of the legislature ever held. Was a member of the faculty in the Normal School, Monmouth, from 1897 to 1902 and president of the Normal School at Ashland 1902 to the close of 1907; was elected prosecuting attorney of the First Judicial District in 1908 and am serving in that capacity at the present time.

If elected to congress I shall labor for the best interests of the nation and the state, will give my support to measures strengthening the power of

the later state Commerce Commission to regulate railway rates, and to prevent the inflation of values as a basis for such regulation; shall strive for revision of the tariff, with the interest of labor constantly in the fore ground, while preserving the Republican principle of protection; shall work for the amendment of the Constitution, providing for the direct election of the United States Senators, and, in general shall give my heartiest support to measures to increase the power of the people in legislation and in government. I believe in government by the people and for the people, that the greatest good may result to the greatest number.
