CIRCUIT COURT TO MEET OCT. 17

Docket Is Quite Light
Thus Far

WORK FOR GRAND JURY

Numerous Alleged Crimes To Be
Investigated, and Several
True Bills Probable

The regular October term of Circuit Court for Lake County will convene one week from next Monday. At present the docket is not lengthy, but it is certain that the attention of the grand jury will be called to numerous alleged violations of the law. One case to be considered will be that of Louis Veyssiere in connection with the death of Jack Barre, and another is that of B. Euhel who is being held by Sheriff Dent on a charge of horse stealing.

Several alleged violations of the local option law will doubtless be considered, providing that any individual can be found who will testify that they have personal knowledge of such violations. It would no doubt assist the officers greatly if the names of persons knowing of such violations were given them or made public, as did the Silver Lake Leader regarding the Paisley affair.

IRRIGATE BY PUMP

Ana River Project People
Get Busy

Will Install System At Once To
Irrigate Lands Next
Season

The stockholders of the Ana River Irrigation Company held their annual meeting this week and elected the following officers: President, R. B. Jackson; Vice President, M. W. O'Brien; secretary and treasurer, C. D. Dowdall. The officers, together with J. F. Barnes and J. W. Nelson, constitute the board of directors.

The company has decided to install a pumping plant sufficiently large to irrigate 2500 acres of land, and the work will be undertaken at once. The estimated cost is \$3000, and the money has already been paid into the treasury. A 14-foot dam has already been constructed, and by placing the power plant a short distance below the dam sufficient power can be obtained to drive the water 40 ft., which will be sufficient to cover the land to be irrigated. It is expected to have everything in readiness for the season of 1911.

INDIAN'S BONES FOUND

Discovered in Northeast Corner of
Crump Lake

PRESUMED TO BE REMAINS OF INDIAN JACK

Jack Mysteriously Disappeared Last Winter, and
Supposed Now That He Was Killed and
Body Placed Under Ice

Sunday a report reached Lakeview that the remains of a human being had been found in the northeast corner of Crump Lake. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Venator and Coroner Wallace left at once to investigate the matter. On arriving at the scene a coroner's jury was empaneled, and the facts developed were about as follows:

It appears that an Indian named Jack, who had been employed by C. W. Head, mysteriously disappeared one night last winter while on his

way home from Plush. The indications are that the remains are his, and the general supposition is that he was killed while on his return home and that the body was taken to the lake and placed under the ice. The dry season caused the waters of the lake to recede from the point at which the body was evidently placed.

There is no clue to the perpetrator of the deed, and the coroner's jury returned a verdict in accordance with the above facts.
