The Roosevelt followers point out that if the Republicans win the Colonel will get the credit. If they lose it will be blamed on a Democratic year.

The cabinet "house party" has dispersed, and Secretary of the Interior Ballinger's actions indicate that the cabinet has not disturbed him. It is reported that President Taft would not permit any discussion of the Ballinger incident, indicating that he has not changed his attitude in the matter.

A Saratoga dispatch of the 29th, ult., says the Roosevelt band wagon is crowded. The strenuous Colonel is reorganizing the party, and the republican delegates are confident of victory in November. Mayor Gaynor's withdrawal from the gubernatorial contest is partly responsible for the feeling.

The State Good Roads Association is very anxious for the people to become better acquainted with petition 351 on the ballot, which reads: "No county shall create any debts or liabilities which shall singly or in the aggregate exceed the sum of \$5000 except to suppress insurrection or repel invasion, or to build permanent roads within the county, but debts for permanent roads shall be incurred only on approval of a majority of those voting on the question." Those at work for the passage of the amendment permitting the bonding of the county for road work say it will be one of the biggest steps Oregon has made toward permanent improvement for a long time.

A boom in both directions, swept both in the imports and exports of the country across the million dollar mark, during the eight months ending with August. The imports were \$1,055,100,000 and the exports \$1,027,400 against \$947,000,000 and \$989,100,000, respectively, for August, 1909. Though the imports of most manufactured materials increased, silk, wool and fibres fell back a little on account of the exceptionally heavy imports of the preceding years. In export unmanufactured, cotton decreased by \$1,300,000 to \$1,925,000 and automobile exports increased from \$5,100,000 to \$8,300,000. Lumber, leather, manufactures of iron, and steel, sewing machines, type writers, scientific instruments, electrical machinery and furniture, also increased while foodstuffs, wheat, flour and meats decreased.

It is rather amusing to see the efforts put forth by certain interested parties to control the "north end" vote, thereby reflecting very seriously upon the intelligence of the people of that section of Lake County. In a recent issue of the Examiner it was stated that W. B. Snider, candidate for sheriff, "did not expect to see so many educated people in the valleys as he found in meeting the residents after a canvass of the sections." In the first place Mr. Snider did not express himself in the manner stated, and in the second if he had used similar language any individual of ordinary intelligence would have certainly understood the meaning that was intended to be conveyed. Every person who has visited the newly settled sections of Northern Lake has been surprised at the class of people who are going in there, being a whole of much higher degree of intelligence than is generally found in a new country. Such being the case the effort of the "smart" people to hoodwink them will no doubt prove retrospective.
