No more substitutes will be coined by the United States mints this year, as the treasury has a large supply for any of the present demands of the country. This will be the first complete cessation of silver coinage since the mints were established.

Is there any good reason why a person claiming to be a Republican should not vote for the Republican choice as expressed at the primary nominating election? Most assuredly not. The various Republican candidates are fully competent for the office to which they aspire, and if you believe in the principles of the Republican party you are certainly in duty bound to support the nominees. They are equal at least in everything to their opponents.

It is the duty and it should be the pleasure of every Oregon Republican to vote the party ticket straight at the election on November 8. There is too great a risk in scratching the head of the ticket, and there is no call for electing any but Republicans. There are many good reasons why there should be no scratching. It will be good sense and good business for Oregon to send word to the rest of the country that she is in the Republican column, and not spotted, nor yoked.—Sales Statesman.

Ceremonies marking the advent of a new judge of the law and the demise of a famous jurist who had gone before him constituted on the 10th the solemn business of the Supreme Court of the United States. Charles E. Hughes, of New York, donned the robes of office as an associate justice with all formalities designed to give dignity to the court and then with a few words of sorrow expressed by the senior Associate Justice, John Marshall Harlan, the court adjourned out of respect to the memory of the late Chief Justice Melvin W. Fuller.

President Taft's message to the next congress will demand many new statutes and economical administrations, and will recommend the passage of a law permitting the development of water power of public land by private capital, the government virtually controlling the plants. It urges an amendment to the Sherman law, permitting railroads to enter into limited agreements regarding rates, subject to the interstate commerce commission, and also urges a federal charter for corporations. The great progress which has been made on the Panama canal is reported, and congress will be urged to assist in establishing a merchant marine. The senators and congressmen will be asked to surrender part of their appointment privileges in order to place more governmental employees under civil service.

Makes Pointed Reply

In a recent issue the Oregonian charged that Hon. A. W. Orton, register of the U. S. Land office at Lakeview, was working against Republican nominees in this campaign, to which Mr. Orton makes the following terse and pointed reply:

Lakeview, Oregon, October 19, 1910.—To Editor Oregonian: My attention has been called to your article in the October 12, 1910, issue regarding myself. I hope you will give publicity to this reply.

In the first place, I do not read your paper because it's news is colored to suit your ends, and that end is the overthrow of anyone who will not be dictated to by you, or any principle you cannot twist to your selfish desires.

As to my working against W. Lair Thompson and Dr. H. P. Belknap, nominees on the Republican ticket for Joint Representatives from this district, the statement is false. I am supporting the Republican ticket, which in the past is more than you can say.

I did all I could in the primaries, as a private citizen, for my cousin, George M. Orton, and for B. F. Mulkey respectively. When they were defeated I bowed to the wishes of my party and will vote with my party, which is again more than you can say.

I do not believe Senator Bourne is trying to influence any Federal appointee. He has not tried to influence me in any way.

WILL R. KING

Judge of the Supreme Court candidate for re-election, six-year term, whose place is sought by Geo. H. Burnett, Assembly nominee.

Judge Will R. King has been a resident of Eastern Oregon for nearly forty years and is one of the pioneers of Malheur County. He moved to Jordan Valley from Umatilla County in the spring of 1878, and with the exception of six years when he was located at Baker City, has been a resident of Malheur. After graduating from a law school in the east, he entered the practice of law in Vale, Ore., in June, 1892. He was at that time elected to the legislature and served six years, two in the House and four in the Senate, during which time he secured the passage of many bills of special benefit to Southeastern Oregon, among which was the Appropriation for roads and bridges, which gave to Malheur any Harney a continuous fund out of which all their steel bridges have been constructed.

Judge King was author of the Irrigation District law, under which we are now working. His decisions during the four years he has been on the supreme bench are classed by the bar with those of the most eminent justices. His decisions upon irrigation law are recognized as leading cases upon that branch of law. His familiarity with and knowledge of all the conditions of Eastern Oregon make it extremely important that he be retained upon the bench, and not be replaced by a man from the western part of the state who knows little if anything of our needs.

Judge King is supported by the bar throughout the state with few if any exceptions. To say nothing of the special reasons why he, as an Eastern Oregon man, should be retained, the platform urged in his support by the non-political judiciary movement, started by the Oregon Bar Association, that "merit and not politics should govern in the selection of judges" is sufficient grounds for his re-election. Politics has nothing to do with the selection of judges. See on this subject pages 31 to 34 of pamphlet to be issued and sent by the Secretary of State to all the voters. New York, Massachusetts, Wisconsin and other states select Supreme Judges without reference to politics. Why should not Oregon be equally progressive? Judge King is one of Malheur's citizens and has been tried. Why permit another from the western part of the state to have his place on the bench?
