commission similar to New York commission, which will have full power and authority to regulate the corporations dealing in gas, electric lights, current and operating street car systems. There is just as much reason for the regulation of these concerns as there is for the regulation of the railroads. More people are directly affected in their personal affairs by the public service corporations in the cities and towns than are directly affected by the railroads and they are entitled to the same protection.

"A statute should be passed by the next legislature creating such a commission or enlarging the powers of the railroad commission so that the affairs of these concerns and all of their intricate dealings with the public may be regulated fairly between themselves and the public. The question of the character of service rendered, compensation, energy and other complaints, generally should be submitted to this tribunal. The New York public service commission is giving good satisfaction to the people of the state and there is no reason why the people of Oregon should not have the same protection and retreat as it accords the people of the Empire state.

It is expected that 20,000 wool growers will visit Portland during January next, when the National Association of Wool Growers will hold its annual convention in that city.

New Church Plans Ready

A meeting was held last Sunday morning at the Catholic Church to decide on a site for the new church, which is soon to be erected here. No decision was arrived at, but a committee is at work and will probably bring in a report in a few days' time. The plans for the new church have been received by Father O'Malley, and will be spoken of more fully in this paper as soon as the site has been chosen.
