Not until death comes out for him on many of us know the real worth of the public man. Such was the case with the late Senator Doliver of Iowa. We all knew his worth as a public man, but not until his home papers contained an account of his death and funeral reached us did we realize his true worth. Not only did the city and nation honor his memory, but labor organizations vied with each other in doing homage to his name.

Dick J. Wilcox was the only candidate for county judge on any ticket at the primary election. His platform pledge was clearly and distinctly set forth in his statement, "Good roads and bridges, economy in all county expenditures," and he made this statement not because some one else suggested it who thought it would be "good politics" to come out strongly on those two points, but because he believed in that way of conducting the county affairs.

Stand pat—consider that Senator Albert B. Cummins' speech was practically notice that he had forsaken the insurgents, and that he now supports the Payne tariff. Senator Cummins' speech is significant in that it shows that the progressives realize the danger to the cause of republicanism if factional strife is to be allowed. Cummins said that with all its inequalities and mistakes, he would rather have the Payne act a thousand years than suffer the disaster of an application of the Democratic tariff treaty or a single month.

The stock argument of the Democrats, used in this county with marked success for several years, is trotted out again this year for use in this campaign, says the Harney County News, and "Good men," "accommodating officials," "no politics in it," "party should not be considered," and other familiar expressions are heard from the shrewd and sly mouthpieces of Democracy intended to lead Republicans away from their moorings and influence them to contribute to the success of the Democratic candidates. The remarks are equally applicable to Lake County. Well suppose we take them at their word and consider just the men who are up for county offices. Here we get the best of it then? Are there any better men in Lake County, or better qualified for the positions than Dick J. Wilcox, Warner E. Salder or P. B. Anderson, the only county Republican nominees who have Democratic opposition? What reason can you give yourself for voting against any of these men in the interests of your political opponents?

September 30, 1910, the money in the road fund of Lake County amounted to \$7,691.72. Six months later it amounted to \$14,034.85 and one year later of September 30, 1910, it was \$19,505.91. The amount raised by taxation during the same period was \$5,528.65, while \$4,712.23 was received from the states and \$36.75 from miscellaneous source. This statement shows that during the past year there has been raised for road purposes \$2,777.44 more than was used, not to mention the \$7,691.72 on hand at the beginning of the year. This state of affairs should not exist for only such an amount of money should be raised as is consistent with an economical administration of county expenses. If it was necessary to raise such an amount for the improvement of the county roads then it should be expended. It is certainly not economy to carry a large amount of cash on hand no matter what point of view you may take.

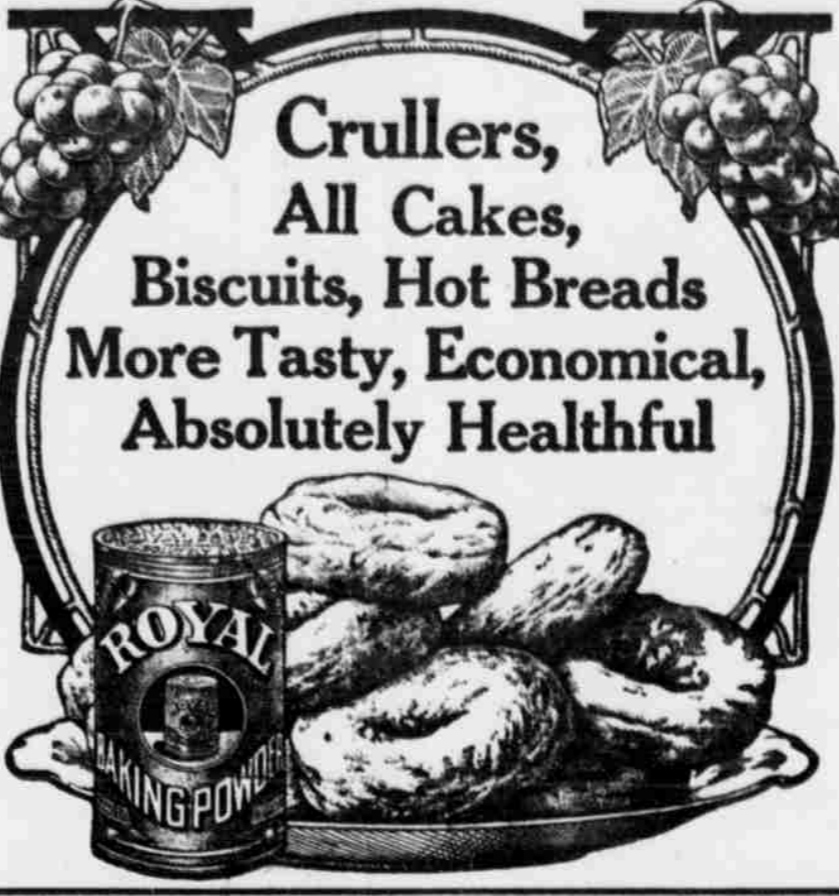

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Why Not Woman's Suffrage?

When two armies face each other in battle the army of aggression before it can engage the main body must drive the skirmish lines of the enemy. The woman's suffrage propaganda has thrown out certain skirmish lines in the public thought and these must be driven in before we can come to the main argument. First, then, those who claim that the ballot is women's right quote from the declaration of independence that, "Taxation without representation is tyranny." But the quotation is not in point, for that sentiment was uttered with no possible reference to individual votes, male or female. It was the declaration of representatives of the 13 colonies that unless these colonies could have representatives in the parliament and in the cabinet to protect their interests King George should not ask us to pay duty. It had no reference to the casting of ballots for men voted in every colony, but it was a declaration that one government ought not tax another without due representation.

In order to make it refer to woman suffrage it would have to be proven that women are not now properly represented by their husbands, fathers or brothers; that the government does not protect them in their property interests, and that they do not get value received for their money.

The question of voting has no reference to the paying of taxes. We pay our taxes in return for the protection to life and property, by the laws of a civilized nation. Some men who have no property vote and many who have no vote, pay large taxes. Numerous young men and women, heirs to large estates, pay immense sums to the government but have no vote. Corporations pay immense sums in taxes, but have no vote. Persons residing in foreign lands or who have lived in this country only for a few years pay taxes but have no voice. In fact voting has no reference whatever to taxes.
