In a "baby" Wright machine at New York last week, Ralph Johnston reached an elevation of 9714 feet, which exceeds the former record by 128 feet.

A Chicago woman has been awarded \$100 damages against her daughter for alienating the affections of her husband. The daughter married her stepfather five days after he had secured a divorce from her mother.

A severe storm ravaged the Atlantic coast last week, bringing with it sharp gales and heavy falls of snow and rain. A snowfall of 21 inches occurred in Pennsylvania, and much damage resulted. That is quite a contrast to the weather experienced here in Lake County where finer weather could not be had.

Postal receipts for the fiscal year ended June 30 were \$224,128,657.62, an increase of 10 per cent over last year. More than one half of this sum was collected in six states—New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Massachusetts and Missouri—the total collections of each state ranging in the order named, the New York post-office collected 10 per cent of the receipts and Chicago came next with eight. The expenses for the year showed an increase of 4 per cent. It cost \$229,977,224.50 to deliver the mail. Railroad transportation cost \$44,715,000; assistant postmasters and clerks in postoffices \$38,045,000; rural free delivery, \$37,411,000; city service, \$31,747,000; post masters, \$27,521,000; railway mail service and clerks, \$9,360,000. More than \$647,000,000 in money orders were issued during the year. More than 15 per cent of them were paid in Chicago and 9 per cent were paid in New York. More than \$98,000,000 went abroad in the form of money orders last year, while less than \$10,000,000 came in the same way. Of the money thus sent abroad Italy got more than \$22,000,000.



## HILL'S AGENT IN CENTRAL OREGON

Expert Is Favorably Impressed and Predicts Great Future

Thomas Shaw, for many years professor of animal husbandry in the University of Minnesota now agricultural expert in the personal employment of J. J. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern railroad company, arrived in Portland recently, completing a 1000-mile automobile trip through Central and Western Oregon. On his return to St. Paul he will submit an exhaustive report covering the agricultural possibilities of the country in Central Oregon. The report will be submitted to J. J. Hill personally and will later be used in an illustrated booklet for use by the roads public utility department.

"I didn't request specific information from Mr. Hill as to their reasons for sending me on this trip," said M. Shaw when asked if the head of the Great Northern is contemplating building a line of railway to Central Oregon. "I presume, however, that he would not ask me to submit a report on the country unless he has some object in view. Everywhere I went I ran across the sentiment that Mr. Hill has seriously turned his attention to the development of those portions of Oregon now unserved by railways and would not be surprised if such is the case."

Professor Shaw is enthusiastic in praise of the country visited. He says that nowhere in the United States is there land which can be put to such diversified use and yield such larger returns. He believes that the bench lands will become famous in the production of winter wheat. He declares that the adoption of dry farming methods will work wonders in that country. He is in charge of 54 demonstration stations now operated by the Great Northern in Montana, and believes that Oregon would benefit were similar stations to show the way to get results from dry farming established in this state.
