SMYRK INVADES AMERICA.

Great Fancy Diver of Australia Anxious to Try Skill Against Our Best. Interest has been added to the indoor swimming season of 1910 by the arrival in this country of Harold Smyrk, the champion fancy diver of Australia and England. Smyrk is here to compete and has issued a challenge to all fancy divers of America. Smyrk represents the best that either Australia or England can produce in the way of crack fancy divers.

The young Australian's visit is particularly welcome because of his having tried for first place with Johansen of Sweden in the contest for the championship of England in 1907. It may

be remembered that at the Olympic games of 1908, in London, Johansen was awarded the high diving title, though many of those present thought that it should have gone to George Gaidzick of the Chicago A. A. Gaidzick will gladly welcome the opportunity of meeting Smyrk, for he feels confident that he can defeat him, and should he do so it will go far toward proving that the American is the superior of Johansen and the peer of all divers as well.

UNIFORM SKATING RULES.

Americans to Compete on Same Terms as Foreigners.

With the American figure skating championship to be held under the same rules as those given European contests there will no doubt be greater interest taken in them than ever before. The fact that these rules will govern will be welcome news to those interested in ice skating in this country, for it puts the championship here on the same level as those of other countries. In fact, the International Skating Union will this season hold the events under exactly the same conditions as govern those of foreign countries. This was sent out by the secretary of the union, who also announced that the championship events will be held early in March at either the St. Nicholas rink in New York or the new Arena in Boston.

The decision to use the same rules as are enforced at European championships was arrived at after careful consideration by such men as Irving Brokaw, champion of 1906, and others who desire to place this country in the same prominent position in the ice skating world that it enjoyed a few years ago.

TO ROW FOR WORLD'S TITLE.

Richard Arndt of Australia Matched With George Welch For \$2,500.

A match between Richard Arndt of Australia, the world's champion professional sculler, and George Welch, the New Zealand champion, for a stake of \$2,500 and the world's title will be rowed next month at Akron, according to a letter received from the antipodes by Coach J. S. Wray of Harvard. Arndt has also been matched to row Edward Barry of England on the Zambezi river, South Africa, next August.

International Power Boat Race Trophy. The Motorboat Club of America has decided on the date for the races for the British International trophy donated by Sir Alfred Harmsworth (Lord Northcliffe). The races will be held at Huntington, N. Y., Aug. 30.
