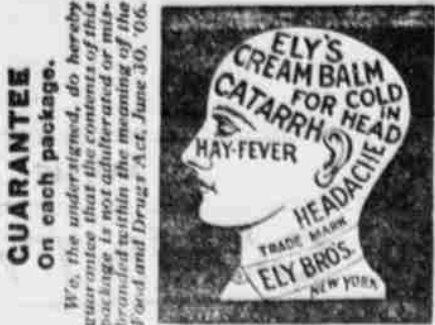

CHICK FEED.

Cracked wheat	Pounds	1
Cracked corn	2
Millet	3
Oatmeal	4
This is the basis for true feed, and the following may be added if desired:			
Kaffir corn	Pounds	5
Cracked peas	6
Cracked rice	7
RAP	8
Hemp	9

After a month or six weeks use this coarser scratch feed:

Whole wheat	Pounds	10
Coarse cracked corn	11
Oats	12
Kaffir corn	13
Barley	14
Millet	15

If you desire to use foreign mash or broiler feed, try the following:

FORCING MASH.

Cornmeal	Pounds	16
Brain	17
Flour midds	18
Beef scrap	19

BROILER FEED.

Cornmeal	Pounds	20
Brain	21
Flour midds	22
Beef scrap	23
Fine salt	24

FEATHERS AND EGGSHELLS. Hops as a side issue and shade are a paying proposition for poultrymen. They furnish nice, cool shade and an average of \$50 to the acre. Certain incubator firms have advanced prices, while others have dropped. The charming flavor of canvasback ducks comes from their eating a celery like cross that grows in Chesapeake bay. SEATS FOR ALL.

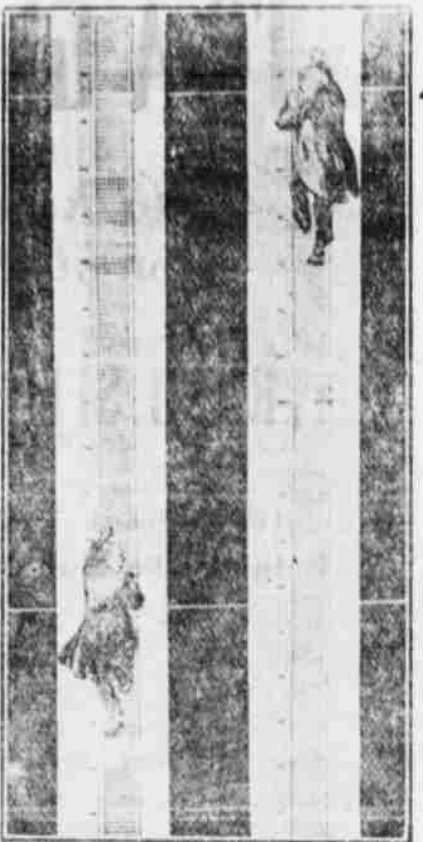

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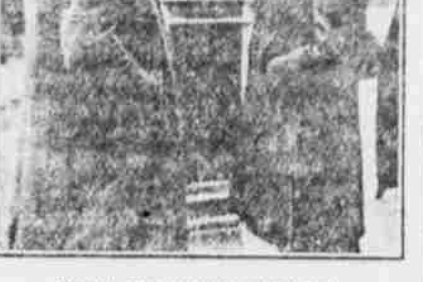


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PARIS TRAFFIC REGULATOR.
