THOMPSON FOR SPEAKER

It is now practically assured that Ben Suelling, of Portland, will be president of the Senate at the coming session of the Legislature. This in effect makes it practically assured that the Speakership will go outside of Multnomah county. Such being the case the Examiner would very much like to see Lake County's Representative secure the place. While Mr. Thompson is not an active candidate for the position, yet letters from other sections of the state indicate that his name is under consideration in connection with the speakership and has encouraged him to become a receptive candidate. In response to a question from a representative of the Examiner Mr. Thompson stated that he was considering the advisability of becoming an active candidate but would defer a definite conclusion until he visited the Willamette valley points. He will leave next week to take his wife and baby to spend the holidays with Mrs. Thompson's parents at Eugene and at that time will determine the chances of a member from Southeastern Oregon to land the speakership. No other member of the house will be better qualified for the position than Mr. Thompson, as he was chief clerk of the House under Speaker Mills during the session of 1905, and again under speaker Davy in 1907. In 1909 he called the house to order, effected a temporary organization and returned to his law practice declining to be a candidate for chief clerk in 1909. Those familiar with the workings of legislative bodies know that aside from the Speaker the chief clerk has more to do with the orderly transaction of business than any one else. The machinery of the House is under his direct supervision, and he becomes familiar with the legislative work. Because of this experience, because of his eminent qualifications for that office and more especially because Lake county should be recognized in this matter, W. Lair Thompson should be made Speaker of the house this winter.

Attorney General Crawford holds that where a city, together with an adjacent territory, is divided into one or more precincts, the city itself can decide upon the local option question by holding an election at which only citizens within the city limits are to vote. He further holds that the home rule amendment to the constitution will be in full force and effect as soon as the votes are canvassed and the result declared by the governor, while the county vote for dry must, under the terms of the local option law, take effect from and after January 1. The law providing that the order of the county court, declaring prohibition in the county, or in a precinct or section of the county, takes effect on the first day of January following the vote. Therefore, the law would take effect January 1 or the county would be dry and will include the city until it votes to the contrary.

Jan Mace, the great English pugilist, died in London last week. He made "barrels of money," but died in poverty. Last year he was obliged to apply for an old age pension. Mace was born in Boston, Norwich, April 8, 1831, and prided himself on his longevity, attributing it to careful living and the fact that he did not use liquor.

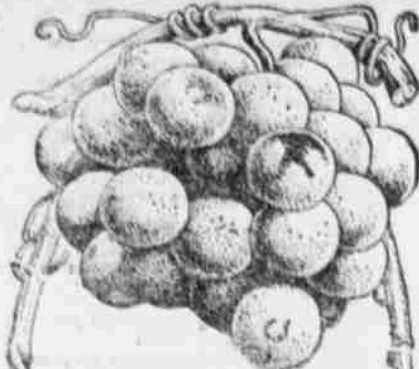
