# LEVY IS 1.6 MILLS

Taxes For Every Oregon **County Shows Decrease** From Those of 1910

Salem, Or., Jan. 4-Final apportionment of the state taxes for varions counties of the state was completed today. A levy of 1.6 mills is made to cover taxes for general state purposes, as against a levy of 2.2 mills for last year.

Considering differences in valuation this is a decrease of 0,6 mills. State taxes for every county in the state show a decrease from last year, though there is an extra 1.25 mill to in charge of the affairs of that organ. be levied for the Monmouth Normal School.
