DOINGS OF 1911

Six big disasters will occur in the United States in 1911. This is not the prediction of an astrologer, but the American Red Cross society.

Experience has taught the Red Cross to expect an average of five or six big disasters in this country each year. It does not undertake to say when or where they will occur, or whether they will be caused by fire, storm, flood, earthquake or explosion, but it is sure they will come.

Experience proves not only that an average of five or six disasters, severe enough to call aid from the Red Cross, may be expected every year in the United States, but the demands from foreign countries are predicted to be much more numerous.

Some idea of the character and variety of the disasters with which the Red Cross deal is given in the review of those which demanded attention during the last twelve months.

They include in the United States: One hurricane, one mine fire, two mine explosions and forest fires in Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and Minnesota. Foreign calamities demanding aid from the Red Cross include: Floods in Mexico, France, Servia and Japan; the Armenian massacres; the earthquake in Costa Rica and the relief of the starving soldiers in Nicaragua.

In the disasters which occurred in the United States 650 lives were lost, while approximately 7,000 persons were given immediate attention. About 6,000 persons lost their homes by fire or hurricane. The Red Cross expended \$19,000 for relief operations in the United States and in foreign countries \$261,500 was spent, making a total of \$280,500. Other relief funds expended in this country in conjunction with those of the Red Cross amounted to \$218,000, making the grand total of relief expenditures for the year under Red Cross leadership \$498,500.

Senator Hughes, of Colorado, died last week after a prolonged illness. He had served a little less than two years of his six-year term.

United States engineers have officially approved the project for a 30-foot channel to the sea from Portland and recommend an appropriation of \$520,000 for starting the work. The officials contemplate the dredging and maintenance of a channel 30 feet deep and 300 wide. This will be far easier, it is believed, than was the original improvement of the river, which has been deepened from 17 to 27 feet at low tide.

The papers received here from all the neighboring states indicate that the storm which prevailed during last week was actually the worst in the entire history of the West. The snow in many of the places reported from averaged from 9 to 12 feet in depth, while the cold was intense. Surely this section must be a favored one, for we certainly escaped anything in the way of very cold weather, while the snow fell to a depth of but several inches.

With prospective railroad building in this neck of the woods much more attention is now being paid Lake county than has heretofore been the case, and the big dillies of Portland have recently devoted much space to this section of the state. In the Sunday Journal of January 8 nearly a full page is given Lake county including a number of views. The descriptive matter is by W. Roche Fick, and covers the field quite thoroughly.

That the senate at this session must face the question of whether the constitution shall be amended to require the election of United States senators by a popular or direct vote of the people, was made apparent last week. A vote which many of the senators considered a test of this sentiment resulted very largely in favor of the proposition. The matter came up in the senate in connection with a joint resolution for the amendment of the constitution recently reported from the committee on judiciary.

Speaker Cannon had his hour of triumph in the house last week, winning the first important political maneuver of the present session of congress. Badly battered after the three day storm that swept the house last March the speaker "came back"

in a way that brought a grim smile of satisfaction to his countenance and left his enemies, the insurgents, discomfited. The speaker was sustained by a majority in a ruling identical to the one made last March, when the house overruled the decision which brought about a combination of the insurgent republicans and democrats. On the eve of their return to power the democrats voted to sustain the ruling of the chair.
