EXPENSIVE STEAK.

Ten Pounds of Beef That Sold For \$48 a Pound.
The highest price ever paid for beef steak so far as is known was at Circle City, Alaska. The first beefsteak that ever reached that town sold for \$48 a pound, according to the newspapers of the time.

When the owner of the precious meat reached the camp the miners turned out in a body to see it. It was used on exhibition and attracted as much attention as an elephant. Everybody wanted a piece of it, and the fees offered were such as would have suited in a mining camp quarrel if it had not been decided to raffle the steak off for the benefit of a hospital which Bishop Rowe was trying to establish for the miners at Circle City.

Bids were started at \$5 a pound and rose briskly to \$85. Finally in order to avoid complications it was decided to sell tickets at prices from 50 cents to \$50 for the privilege of drawing for slice. After \$480 worth of tickets had been sold the drawing began, and the relief of those in charge of the sale no trouble resulted.

Gift to the Ugly Man.

The practice of making such gifts appears to have arisen in America and is nearly obsolete. It therefore seems to deserve a note. It goes back to Harvard college (now Harvard university) beyond 1794.
