TEDDY WILL MAKE ONE GRAND TOUR

**March Will See Him Sweep
Around Boundaries
of Country**

NEW YORK, Jan. 26—Theodore Roosevelt's next tour will be begun here March and will sweep around the boundaries of the country, through the South Atlantic and Gulf States, the Southwest, up the Pacific Coast to Idaho and Montana and thence direct home. Roosevelt has accepted 15 engagements to make speeches and probably will make more.

The itinerary given out is:
March 8, leaves New York at 10:25 a. m.
March 9, Atlanta, Ga., speaks before the Southern Commercial Congress.
March 11, Birmingham, Ala., speaks before the child labor convention.
March 11, Jackson, Miss., speaks at the invitation of Governor Noel.
Leaves 1 p. m.
March 11, arrives New Orleans 6 p. m., speaks before the Commercial Club.
March 12, leaves New Orleans.
March 13, San Antonio, Texas, speaks before the cattle-raisers' convention.
March 14, leaves San Antonio 9 a. m.
March 15, Albuquerque, N. M., foregathers with a delegation of Rough Riders. March 16, leaves Albuquerque 1 p. m.
March 17, Grand Canyon, Ariz.
March 18, arrives Phoenix, Ariz., 9 a. m., motors 75 miles across the country to the opening of the Roosevelt dam, which will bring several million acres under irrigation. Sleeps at the town of Roosevelt.
March 19, motors to Phoenix, stop ping on the way at Mesa, where his son Archie is at school. March 20, leaves Phoenix 7:40 p. m.
March 21, Los Angeles, speaks at the invitation of Governor Hiram Johnson and at Pasadena, nearby, before the Throop Polytechnic Institute.
March 22, arrives San Francisco, remains about ten days and delivers the Earl lectures, six in number, before the University of California at Berkeley.

Nearing Completion

Bend Bulletin: The Oregon Trunk will be open to traffic to Madras by February 15th and will be receiving freight by the first of March. Such is the assurance contained in a letter to N. P. Smith of Bend from Marshall Wells Co. of Portland, from whose transportation manager emanates the foregoing statement, he having been so advised by the O. T. Thus far the Deschutes railroad has given out nothing definite in regard to its accepting freight.

According to C. W. Monahan, superintendent of construction for Henry & McFee, 90 per cent of the grade between Crooked River and Bend is completed; and about 200 men are finishing up the balance. The power machinery at Crooked River for rushing work, etc., is being doubled in capacity. The capacity of the trains bringing construction material up the Deschutes Canyon has been doubled, eight engines now being employed in this work instead of four as previously.

E. D. Ede has finished his reservoir at the mouth of Surveyors Springs Canon west of Wagon Tire, says the Silver Lake Leader. The dam measures 50 feet at the base and is 10 feet in width at the top. While digging out the reservoir he opened up a fine spring which will at all seasons furnish what water is needed for stock while the reservoir itself will hold enough water to irrigate at least 200 acres of dry land below it. Mr. Ede is enthusiastic over his new location and feels more than encouraged over the results which his summer's work has disclosed.
