## POSTAL SAVINGS BANKS MAKE GOOD

Deposits in 48 Banks During January Totaled \$60,000.00

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—"If the necessary appropriations were available I would establish a postal savings bank tomorrow in 500 additional cities and towns in the United States." This statement was made by Postmaster General Hitchcock in view of reports of the first month's operations of the postal savings system. The reports are most gratifying to Mr. Hitchcock. The total deposits in the 48 existing postal banks for January will approximate \$60,000. This is an average of about \$1200. Assuming that this average will be maintained throughout the year, the aggregate of annual deposits will be close to three-quarters of a million dollars.

## WEST AND KAY WIN OVER BOWERMAN

Sharp Lines Drawn on Purchasing Board Favor Administration

SALEM, Or., Feb. 10.—In a sharp engagement in which the Administration friends and the Bowermanites mustered their full strength, the Bowerman forces went down to defeat last night. It was a "show down" on the bills to create a board to purchase state supplies. One bill, S. B. 56, was prepared by Bowerman and the other, S. B. 166, was prepared by Governor West and State Treasurer Kay, and was introduced by Bean and Calkins. The Administration forces won and defeated the Bowerman measure.

This was a clear-cut fight and every senator was on hand. The two bills had been referred to a committee a few days ago. Bowerman managing this when he was then in a tight box with enough votes against him to wipe him out.

Calkins moved that S. B. 166 be substituted for S. B. 56, and Bowerman opposed the motion. On a standing vote to substitute, the Senate stood 14 to 14, and President Sell took cast the deciding vote with the Administration forces and against Bowerman. Next came the passage of S. B. 166, and it carried in the Senate by a vote of 17 to 13.

A move to indefinitely postpone S. B. 56, was lost, but when Bowerman managed to get his bill to a vote it was lost by a vote of 17 to 13.

Without mining words, the friends of S. B. 166 indicated that the other crowd was playing politics, and has been and will be trying to hobble the new Administration. Bowerman personally retorted the statements and declared that he has so conducted himself during the session as to avoid any suspicion of trying to interfere with the Administration and that he was willing and desirous to protect all the rights and privileges of the Governor.

## JUDGE BENSON TO BROOK NO DELAY

Attorneys Can Be Heard Every Saturday In Future

Klamath Chronicle: Every Saturday in the future when in the city and able to attend to his duties as jurist in the circuit court, Judge Henry L. Benson has announced he will hold his court to give the attorneys who have cases before the court to be argued, a chance to be heard.

Judge Benson has made it plain since he became judge that he was going to brook no more delay than absolutely necessary in the handling of all cases before the court. This is one of the moves he has inaugurated to press matters, and it will be a welcome departure for the local attorneys who have pending actions which they wish to argue.

that the mention of the state of Oregon will catch more interest and catch it quicker back here than the mention of any other state.
