be spent in the northwest. The imminent extensions are: Bisection of Washington by completion of the North Coast from Spokane to Seattle via Lewiston; construction of numerous branches of this line to develop the state; an east and west line across Oregon from Ontario on the eastern border through Harney valley to the Pacific coast at Crescent City, Cal., via Lakeview and Klamath Falls; extension of the Northwestern Pacific along the California coast to meet the foregoing line at Crescent City; east and west line across northern central Oregon to Lebanon on the Southern Pacific via Prineville to connect with Ontario-Crescent City line near Burns; extension of the Deschutes line south to connect with the Weed-Natron division at Odell.

"Other probabilities are a line from Lakeview, Or., south to the Central Pacific at Ferrol, an extension from the Southern Pacific at or near Boise, Ariz., northeast to the company's coal fields at Durango, Cal., finally extension of the North Platte branch of the Union Pacific to Nebraska, now terminating at Northport, across to meet the main line at or near Medicine Bow, Wyo. The last named improvement is assured. It will reduce and eliminate the hard climb from Cheyenne, Wyo., north to Medicine Bow.

"The most important part of the extensions, however, is development of the great triangle bounded by the Central Pacific, the Southern Pacific coast lines north to Portland and the Navigation company and Short Line. This area contains 50,000,000 acres capable, with moderate irrigation, of producing a vast amount of grain and fruit. It will yield a boundless supply of timber, is already producing considerable oil, and promises oil. With the settlement of this region consequent upon the advent of transportation facilities, cross of the Harriman lines is a solved problem for many years to come.

"This development of new territory is the vital point of the Harriman program. The double tracking of the main lines was unavoidable when once the opening of the northwest was assured."

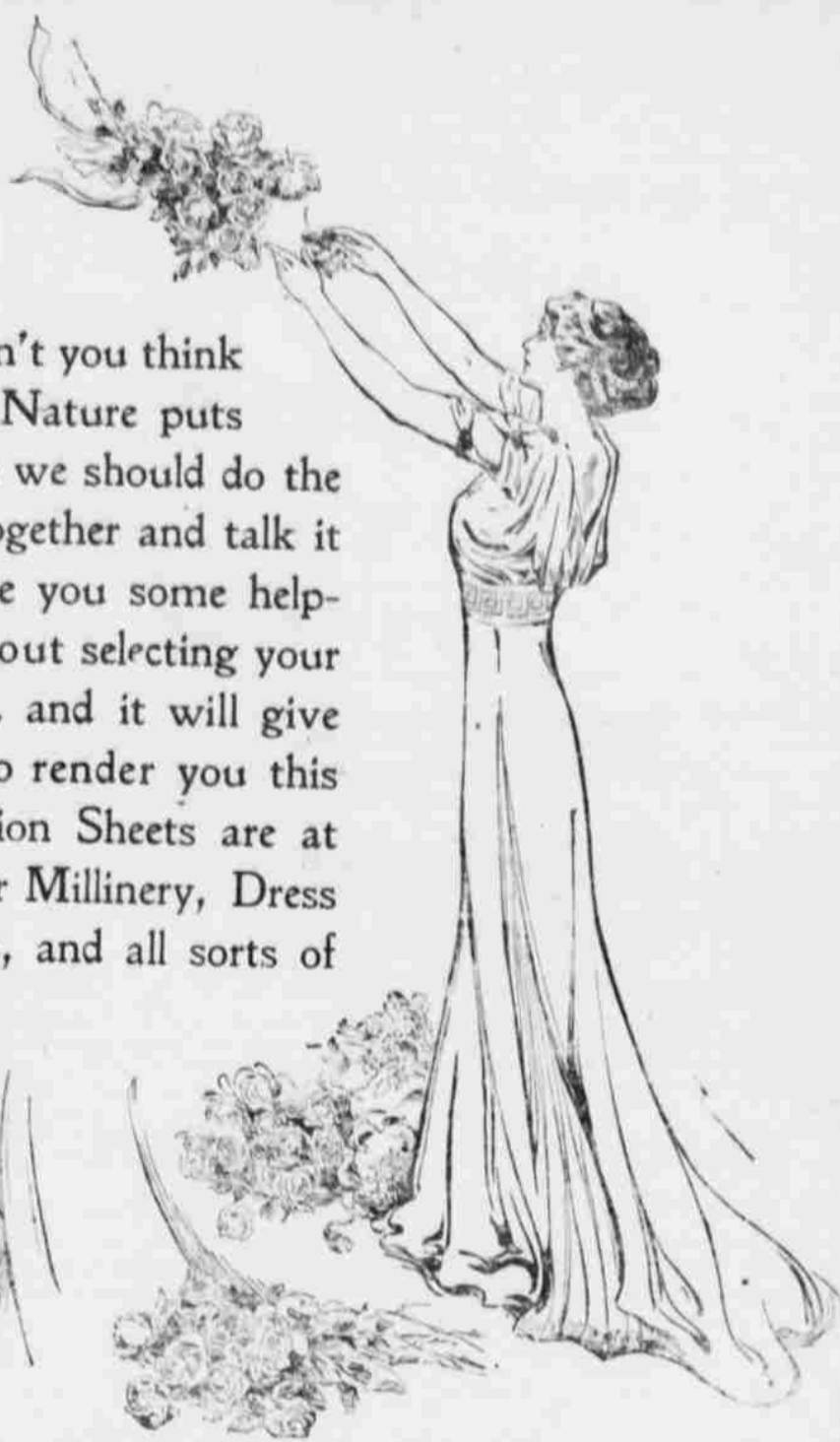
### Two "500" Parties

hundreds of visitors who were attending the Oregon Valley land drawing at that time, and even the old residents of this county were amazed at the variety and excellence of the productions. In no way could the expenditure of a like amount of money contribute as much to the advertising of this county, and no amount of literature could have conveyed the positive evidence of the merits of our soil, climate and productions, as did this actual display of its products which enabled people from almost every state in the Union to view the actual products and prove their excellence. It was the universal verdict among our visitors that it would have been a credit to any state or city in the United States. Whether the returns from this expenditure were worth the price, we can safely leave to the people of Lake County and particularly to those of Lakeview.

Inquiries from prospective settlers have grown from a few scattering letters a week, until, including the daily lists sent from the Portland Commercial Club of those who make inquiry regarding Lake County, they amount to more than fifty each day. Every letter and inquiry has been answered, and the opportunities and advantages we have to offer has been made known to all who have asked. The results from our work are just beginning to be realized and it is now up to the people of Lakeview to say whether or not it is to continue.

The Oregon Development League of Portland have voted to expend \$20,000 during 1911 in publicity work for Oregon. Lake County has not been asked to contribute one dollar to this fund, and from my correspondence with the various officers of that organization, I am convinced that outside of Portland itself, there is no section of the state that receives more of their hearty support and cooperation than does Lake County. They do not wait for us to ask their aid, but are always ready to take the initiative whenever they see an opportunity to work out some scheme for our benefit. As evidence of this statement I copy two letters received today, which are samples of many they have written:

"Portland, Ore., Mar. 14, 1911.  
"Mr. V. L. Snelling, Board of Trade, Lakeview, Ore.

"Dear Mr. Snelling: We have only about a dozen copies of the Lakeview booklet left. It has been very much in demand by visitors here. Can you furnish us with more?"

"Portland, Ore., Mar. 16, 1911.  
"Gentlemen: The last report of the Post-office Department shows that you have an R. F. D. route at your postoffice. Does your community stand in need of one at this time, and has the postmaster taken any steps to have one established? If so, will you write me the particulars of his action, and any information as to the success he has had? This office would be glad to co-operate with your organization in accomplishing what you wish done in this direction. We believe the time is opportune to take such action.

In addition to what the commercial bodies of Portland are doing for us, we must not overlook the vast sums that are being spent by the Hill and Harriman roads to advertise all of Eastern Oregon, and bring us settlers to help the developer and upbuilding of Lake County and for how long do you suppose will others try to help us after we cease to try to help ourselves?

For years the people of Lakeview have boasted of having the best interior town on the coast; our visitors have uniformly been found in the praise of our little city, its modern and attractive homes; its substantial and elegant public buildings; the stability and financial standing of its business houses, and above all, the liberality and public spirit of its people.

I venture the assertion that today there is not another town of its size on the Pacific Coast that is so well and favorably known as is Lakeview, and I also venture another assertion that there is not another town of its size on the Pacific Coast that does not support some kind of an organization for the purpose of telling the whole world the good things about its soil and the country that made it. Now it is up to the people of Lakeview to say whether they will support the reputation that has cost them years of struggle to build up; whether they are going to get onto the band wagon and go forward with the wave of progress that is sweeping over the entire state, or whether they are quitters and are ready to start on the back track. I believe I know what the voters will be for I have faith in Lake County, Lakeview and their people.

The present officers of the Board of Trade wish to say that there will be a meeting at the Board of Trade rooms Friday evening, at 7:30, and ask all those who are interested to come regardless of whether or not they are members. Let us get it settled, talk this matter over together, decide what is best to be done together and do it.
