FRANK W. BENSON

There was heroism in the career of Frank W. Benson. His failing years were a splendid testimonial of the manliness of manhood. The fortitude with which he made his last stand for life during the past three years affords a glimpse at the inner workings of his splendid character. He never surrendered. Though this malady held him in an inexorable embrace, he struggled on to do a man's part in the affairs of life. Death had to come and take him in his castle. The uncomplaining patience with which the former governor struggled to make good in the role of a trusted public official commands the steadfast admiration of all the thousands by whom it was observed.

No one in the public life of Oregon has enjoyed wider confidence. In all the capacities in which he served the state, as well as in a private sphere, his conduct gave him a universal characterization for probity, dependability and steadfastness of honorable purposes. The shafts of criticism have rarely been leveled at Mr. Benson. Almost more than any other man in state life, he has been accredited with upright motives by almost universal consent.

Emphasis of this is seen in the plurality of more than 36,000 with which he was preferred in the last election and that at a time when his survival was widely doubtful. In that election he received a total vote of 65,768.

The state will mourn his passing. Thousands of personal friends will feel the sharp sting of grief at the going of this quiet, sincere, and generous man. Youth should find in his repute the inspiration for correct living. A man who refused re-election to the governorship of his state is unusual. There was such an episode in the career of our dead secretary of state. It is an episode that will pass with his name into the enduring annals of the commonwealth.

The deadlock in the Iowa legislature ended last week when Judge William S. Kenyon of Fort Dodge was elected United States senator to succeed the late Senator Johnathan P. Dolliver, following perhaps the hardest senatorial contest ever fought in Iowa. Judge Kenyon is a personal friend of Attorney Farrell, of Lakeview, who is highly pleased with the result.

To the Editor

To the Editor of the Examiner:
Reno, Nev., April 12—J. F. Adams, vice president and general manager of the N. C. & O. Telephone and Telegraph company, announced yesterday that within the next 30 days work would be started on the extension of the telephone lines from Alturas, Cal., to Lakeview, Ore., a distance of about sixty miles. As this distance can only be spanned during the summer months all the work will be rushed. It is expected that the connections will be completed within sixty or ninety days. When completed the line will afford direct communication with Davis Creek. New Pine Creek, and will also allow connections with Cedarville and Bidwell.

At Hot Springs a connection will be made with the California Northern Telephone and Telegraph company line for services into the Susanville and Honey Lake districts.
Mr. Adams, who will supervise the work, has the credit of placing the present line between Reno and Alturas in commission. In addition he has extended lines throughout the state. For the past eight years he has been engaged in the telephone business in Nevada making Reno his headquarters.

Shake Their Friends

Paine on Sunday last purchased the steam launch "Iola" from Earl Hindle, and are to use it on Goose Lake during the coming summer for business purposes only. The launch has a 12 H. Second Homesteads

February 13, 1911, Congress passed an act providing that any person, prior to its passage, who has made entry under the homestead or desert-land laws but who from any cause lost, forfeited or abandoned the same, shall be entitled to the benefits of the homestead or desert land laws as though such former entry had not been made. However, in applying for a second entry under the act it is necessary to furnish a description and date of the former entry. In order to get the benefit of the act it is necessary to show that the former entry was not relinquished for a valuable consideration in excess of the filing fees paid on the original entry.

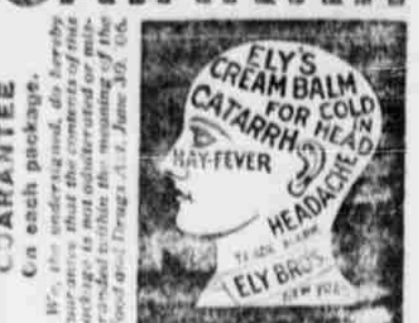
