tween May 23rd and September 1st.

The lien or cost to settlers is fixed at \$421,212.15, or \$35 per acre. When 80 per cent of the lands are sold, the control and management is to be transferred to the settlers, the company retaining a proportional interest, depending upon the amount of land unsold. The company, while in control, is authorized to collect fifty cents per acre for maintenance.

No land can be sold by the company until water is within one-half mile of each forty-acre tract and lands opened for entry and sale by the Board. The company is not under bonds. Their lands are at an elevation of about 4,700 feet above sea level. Since the adoption of the new water code and a new State law accepting the Carey Act, there has been a great revival of interest in reclamation under the Carey Act, and several applications for segregation have been made. As all of these are still pending before the General Land Office, they are only mentioned briefly at this time. The several proposed projects are as follows:

Selection List No. 24—Jordan Valley Project.

This project is situated in Jordan Valley, Malheur County, about sixty miles south of Caldwell, Idaho. The elevation of lands ranges from about 3,600 feet to about 4,300 feet above sea level. Water is to be taken from Jordan Creek and Boulder Creek. It is expected the natural flow will suffice up to about June 15th after which storage water will be used, the intention being to construct a 150-foot dam in Jordan Creek, in Idaho, just across the Oregon line. The project embraces between 50,000 and 60,000 acres, of which 37,870.74 acres has been applied for as Carey Act lands, the remainder being land under private ownership, or Road Grant Lands.

The list for withdrawal was filed in the U. S. Land Office at Burns on November 23, 1909. It is now pending before the General Land Office. Application to the Board for segregation was made by Messrs. Fred J. Palmer and George S. Parks, of Jordan Valley, Oregon. H. S. Williams of Caldwell, Idaho, was appointed selecting agent. Selection List No. 25—Harper Basin Project.

This project is situated in Malheur County, about twenty miles from Vale, Oregon. The land lying in Township 18, 19, and 20 South, Range 41 East. Water will be stored in a reservoir on a branch of Bully Creek. Application for the segregation of 15,132.76 acres is now pending before the General Land Office, lists having been filed in the U. S. Land Office at Burns, on December 17, 1909. George Hayes, of Vale, Oregon, was appointed selecting agent.

FRANK W. BENSON CALLED BY DEATH

Ex-Governor Passed Away at Redlands, Cal., Last Week

Redlands, Cal., April 14.—Frank W. Benson, former Governor of Oregon and for the past five years Secretary of State of Oregon, died here early this morning. He came here early last December in poor health. After staying at the Hotel Casa Loma he took apartments with his wife and servants. They made few friends while here, living a retired and secluded life. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

Only Secretary Benson's immediate family was at the bedside when death came. Yesterday it was thought Secretary Benson had rallied somewhat, but early this morning he took a turn for the worse and died before a physician could reach his bedside. His death was not unexpected. The family practically had given up hopes for his recovery when they arrived in Los Angeles last winter. The body will be taken back to Roseburg for interment.

Salem, Or., April 14.—Following the receipt of the news of Secretary of State F. W. Benson's death this morning, Governor West sent out telegrams to Dr. R. E. Lee Stiner, at Redlands, Cal., asking as to arrangements for the funeral; to Mrs. Benson conveying expressions of condolence, and to Adjutant-General Finzer, ordering a military guard of honor to meet the funeral party at the state line, when the body is brought to Oregon.

The Governor has issued the following proclamation:

"Whereas, Almighty God, in His wisdom, has seen fit to call from this world Hon. Frank W. Benson, Secretary of State, and

"Whereas, Throughout his public and his private life, he was a man of high ideals, unswerving in his public duty and true to his trust; and

"Whereas, as an honorable citizen and honest public official he, living, won the confidence and respect of all, and his memory now merits the reverence and regret of the people of the state of Oregon.

"Now, therefore, I, Oswald West, Governor of the State of Oregon, request that the flags of all public buildings in the state be placed at half mast there to remain, indicative of public sorrow and esteem, until after the funeral services have been held."
