A great city—the greatest in all the land—is spalled at the prospect of being left without something to laugh at during the coming summer. "Dreamland," the greatest pleasure point of gay Coney Island has been destroyed by fire.

One of the most pitiful and at the same time the most revolting trials for murder that has ever taken place in the Pacific Northwest has been in progress through the week at Tacoma, where a man is charged with having murdered a woman by beating her with an iron until she could no longer resist then holding her under water until she drowned. The fight was evidently between a brute and a terma-gant. The pitiful feature of it is the fact that it was witnessed from its beginning to its fatal ending by three children of tender years.

In his introduction to the "Year Book" for 1910, just issued, Secretary Wilson says: "Nothing short of science can grasp the value of the farm products this year. At no time in the world's history has a country produced farm products within one year amounting to \$8,926,000,000, which is the value of the agricultural products of this country for 1910. This amount is larger than that of 1909 by \$305,000,000, an amount of increase over the preceding year which is small for the more recent years.

Prosecution of the Western Retail Dealer's association, including retail lumbermen in Oregon, Idaho and Washington, is contemplated by the federal government, it is said. Special agents of the treasury department are known to have been investigating the workings of the organization for some time. One of them left for Washington last week with information concerning the association and its alleged agreements in violation of the anti-trust law. It is probable that no case will be filed in Portland but that either Spokane or Seattle will be selected as the filing place for proceedings against the north western retailers. The headquarters of the western association is at Spokane.
