from the Shoshone reservation, all armed and who had returned to the country with the avowed purpose of avenging Snake River Mike's band. The Indians he said were "on the war-path," a situation well indicated to the experienced men who have been watching their movements for several days.

Turner completed his prospecting and returned to Reno for a day or two without running across the hostiles. They are camped now in Soldier Meadows and it is but a question of time

when the first killing will occur. Little High Rock canyon is in Washoe county about 150 miles as the crow flies from Reno. Soldier Meadows is southeast a few miles and was the scene of a historic battle in the early days. The country is very rough and affords excellent protection for Indians in case pursuit and recapture is attempted.

The news indicates the truth of what was feared by old Indian fighters, that the Shoshones will not rest with the extermination of Indian Mike's band. The young braves have been brooding over the result of the last battle and, by some pretext or by stealth, have gotten from the reservation and traveled over 600 miles to the very spot the feud began.
