COMMISSION HAS POWER IN ALASKA

The Interstate Commerce Commission has been directed by the Court of Appeals of the District of Columbia to assume jurisdiction over railways and carriers in Alaska. The Court held that Alaska is a territory of the United States within the meaning of the Act of Congress regulating commerce.

The writ was issued in the case of the Humboldt Steamship Company, of Seattle, whose petition for an order requiring the railways of Alaska to file schedules or rates had been denied by the commission. The Court held that the Commission erred when it declined to entertain the petition.

The act of the Commission had placed the burden of railway regulation in Alaska upon the Secretary of the Interior.

To Investigate Plants

Mr. E. C. Eggleston, Assistant Botanist of the Bureau of Plant Industry, arrived here yesterday for the purpose of working in co-operation with the Forest Service and determining, if possible, the cause of so many sheep being poisoned each year in this section.

Mr. Eggleston came here direct from New Mexico, where he has been making special studies plants several of which he has with him. He also collected quite a few at Doyle, Nevada on his way up here.

The first trip to be made from Lakeview by Mr. Eggleston will probably be to the Lake Albert country, where numerous sheep die each year while traveling from the desert to the summer range. This locality was visited last June by Dr. Tiedstrom, Government plant specialist, who found several suspicious specimens such as the milkweed, *Asclepias speciosa*, which specimens is now being carefully studied in the laboratory at Washington.

Mr. Eggleston will carry on the work started by his predecessor, and in order that he may be given an opportunity to study sheep poisoning cases immediately after they occur as might be well for all sheep men who have the misfortune to lose any stock through eating poisonous plants to immediately notify the gentleman at Lakeview.

MIXTURE TO KILL ALL TREE PESTS

"There may be any number of efficient contact insecticides, but the tobacco compounds and kerosene emulsion are inferior to none in their killing properties," says H. F. Wilson of the entomology department of the Oregon Agricultural College, discussing garden pests and methods of getting rid of them.

"Black-Leaf, or Black-Leaf 40, are tobacco compounds made by the Kentucky Tobacco Product company of Louisville, Ky. Printed directions for use are given on each can. The kerosene emulsion is usually prepared as a stock solution and then diluted to the required strength for spraying. The proportions are half a pound of hard soap to a gallon of water and two of kerosene.

"The soap should be dissolved in boiling water, and the kerosene added after removing the container from the fire. The mixture should then be thoroughly agitated until it is a creamy white. This is best done by using a hand-pump, forcing the mixture through the hose and back to the container. This makes three gallons of stock solution which can be diluted to the required strength by adding given amounts of water. To find the amount of water necessary to add to each three gallons of stock solution for a given percentage, one should divide that percentage into two hundred and subtract three from the result. For example, for a 15 per cent solution: 15 is in 200 13 1/3 times; subtracting 3 we have 10 1/3, the number of gallons of water to be added to 3 gallons of stock for a 15 per cent solution. In the same way we find a 20 per cent solution requires 7 gallons of water; a 7 per cent solution 25 1/3 gallons of water."

CLASSIFICATION OF FARM LANDS

While Oregon is a land of great productiveness, its fertile valleys and foot hills being capable of producing an abundance of about everything that grows, there is a strong tendency upon the part of many real estate dealers throughout the state to sell newcomer land on the basis that it will produce just what they want to grow. This is not true of Oregon soil any more than the soil of any other state. There is a difference and the real estate man who makes the discrimination is not only doing himself and the state proper service, but is doing his duty by the investor.

Perhaps we can raise a good crop of grain on fruit land and vice versa, but to get results that count for most there should be classification of lands. The agent who classifies the lands he has for sale and makes himself thoroughly conversant with the properties of the soil and its ability to produce certain crops can establish a reputation for discriminate dealing with the public that ought to bring him a big business of the class that is profitable.

We have splendid soil in and around Lakeview. It will produce a variety of crops unequalled in any other locality in the state, yet there are lands better adapted to fruit than others, while some lands give better yield of grain and vegetables. To put these lands under proper classification and sell them upon the basis of their fitness to best produce crops ought to be an important feature of the agent's business and the more it is made so the better standing this county will have among investors in our lands.

UNIVERSITY PLAN BY MRS. HARRIMAN

Mrs. E. H. Harriman is to be the founder of a great university in the west as a glorious monument to the memory of her husband.

It became known that Mrs. Harriman, casting about for some means of disbursing her great fortune in a way that would be of benefit to the people of the country, had decided upon the establishment of an institution of learning as affording the best medium for such disbursement. Her plans are not fully developed, but in a tentative way she has decided to found a university that will be second to none in the country as to curriculum and endowment. Millions as needed will be supplied from the Harriman estate to make this the greatest educational enterprise in the world. The institution will be called the Edward H. Harriman university.

Speculations as to the exact location of the Harriman university favors Southern California. Mrs. Harriman has not divulged her plans in this respect, except to say that the institution will be on the Pacific coast. It had been assumed that Nevada or California would stand the best chance of securing the great foundation, but this is only conjecture.

The track athletes at O. A. C. closed the season with the election of Leroy R. McKenzie, a junior in the electrical engineering course from Sumerville, Union county, as captain for next year's team. Mr. McKenzie holds the college record for the javelin throw, and has given the team strong support in the weight events this year.
