Down in the Panama canal zone the United States Government runs department stores, bakeries and railroads. It furnishes homes for the workers and supplies them with electricity at minimum cost. No shoddy goods are sold. Market supplies and provisions are brought from New York and sold cheaper than they can be purchased at retail in the United States. The high cost of living has been eliminated as a household problem. Moreover, the most perfect safety devices are in use, and workers who are injured receive compensation without suing for damages. This whole scheme has been worked out as the only way to accomplish the biggest engineering job in the world. In undertaking the task Colonel Goethals, presiding genius at the canal, evidently was not worried by statesmen at home who are accustomed to say that such things would "destroy incentive." In what way does this differ from socialism, concerning which we are hearing so much nowadays? In this, William Allen White points out in his Emporium Gazette, that the work accomplished under Colonel Goethals lacks the element of democracy. "But," he adds, "if this were added and the labor expended in the production of consumable goods, it would be a fair forecast of what Socialists say is coming to the United States."
