Operations Will Be Commenced Within Next Two Weeks

BANNER EVENT OF BEND PARTY TRIP

Banquet at Paisley Terminated Such By Boosters After Return Home

The Oregonian's correspondent gave the following account of the recent trip of the Bend boosters through this section:

Leaving Bend early Thursday morning the party passed through La Pine, Crescent, where they were entertained at dinner, and Fort Klamath, arriving at Klamath Falls late at night. After a day of sightseeing at Klamath Falls a banquet was tendered the visitors.

Saturday, with stops at Bonanza, the trip was made to Lakeview. There a smoker in the Court House brought out more than 300 persons. The next morning was devoted to an auto trip to the California line, viewing the fertile Goose Lake districts en route.

At Paisley on Sunday night, however, occurred what the members of the outing characterize as the banner event of the trip, this being the banquet at which they were guests of the people of that isolated but prosperous community. A feature was the speech of F. L. Young, representing the Oregon Borax Company, which operates a borax mine 20 miles from Paisley. Mr. Young said that his company already was at work upon a road from the borax deposits to connect with the lately constructed Bend-Burns road, upon which it intended to freight the borax to the railroad at Bend. The use of traction engines is contemplated upon this route, each outfit having a capacity that is expected to be as high as 75 tons. When this borax is shipped to Portland and other points, it is the intention to load the empty cars with freight for the return trip, thus opening a new, and what is said to be a cheaper, method of freight importation from Portland to Paisley and Lakeview.
