CAVALRY HORSES RAISED IN WEST

Washington, June 26.—Western horsebreeders are soon to be called upon to co-operate with the government in a most comprehensive movement looking after the raising of army mounts, and the territory west of the Missouri is to contribute its quota of horses for the cavalry of the future. Government recognition of the fact that the West is breeding superior army mounts, with better wind greater endurance and capable of withstanding the hardships of Army campaigns has at last advanced to a point where it promises to be of immense practical value to western horsemen, whose animals heretofore have found little favor when Uncle Sam sought mounts for his cavalrymen. Now it is planned to establish one of the government breeding stations in the home of the cow pony, and that section is to be placed on the same footing as Kentucky in supplying cavalry mounts for the future.

During the past year the Secretary of War requested the co-operation of the Secretary of Agriculture in evolving some plan for enabling the Army to obtain suitable horses. Many experts were consulted and extensive investigations conducted, and as a result a plan has been formulated that will provide over 2000 mounts yearly from Government owned stallions. It is proposed to divide the United States into four breeding stations, one of which is to be located in the West—Montana, Wyoming, Oregon, Washington and perhaps California. In this western district the plan proposes to place 15 thoroughbreds and ten standard-bred stallions, in charge of the Government agents. The terms of service are to be free, but mares must be approved by the proper officer as of the type desired. The owner will be required to enter into a contract with the War Department to give an option on the resulting foal during the year it is 3 years old, at a price to be fixed before the mare is bred. The mare must remain in the breeder's possession until the foal is weaned, and in case the mare is disposed of before the government has exercised its option, a service fee must be paid. Prices are to be fixed annually for each state by a board before each breeding season opens.

Of particular interest to western horsebreeders is the incorporation of a report by Captain Conrad, in the report of Chief Melvin, of the Bureau of Animal Industry, in which it is said the old-time undesirable cow pony of the West has most entirely disappeared, and has given place to larger animals frequently having a cross of draft blood. Other reports made to the Board showed the Western horse to be the ideal cavalry mount. It could substitute on rough forage when necessary, drink almost any kind of alkali water and withstand greater hardships than the thoroughbred. Sound of wind and limb, the Western horse, as bred today, has strong argument in its favor.

It is believed this plan could be put in operation for the first year at a cost not to exceed \$250,000. The expense in subsequent years is estimated at \$10,000 and Congress will be asked to make the necessary appropriation some time during the coming winter.

European countries long ago have found it necessary to supervise the breeding of horses in order to supply the demands of the Army and every European country, with the exception of England, has for years been encouraging the breeding of proper Army mounts. It is interesting to note that conditions now confronting England and America in this regard are identical, and that both countries are about to adopt some such plan as here outlined. On the basis of 40 mares per stallion, the proposed system would cost the government about \$40 per colt, but the results obtained would far outweigh any objection as to additional expense.

Graduates From 11 States

The graduates this year at O. A. C. included men and women from 11 states and 1 foreign country. India was represented by 1 student, Oregon by 106, Alaska by 2, California, Wisconsin 2, Washington 8, South Dakota and Indiana 1 each, Arizona, Iowa and Colorado 1 each. The 49 officers for next year's regiment include representatives of 7 states—Pennsylvania, Indiana, Idaho, Michigan, Oregon, Washington and California.

WHEAT PRODUCTION IN UNITED STATES

The recent estimate that the 1911 wheat crop will be the largest ever produced in the United States, as announced by the Department of Agriculture, lends interest to the records of production in, and movements into and out of the country of wheat and its products as published by the Bureau of Statistics, Department of Commerce and Labor. Wheat has always been an important factor both in the production and foreign commerce of the United States, and continues to increase in importance in the matter of production, though somewhat decreasing in the quantity exported.

The wheat production in the United States in 1870 was 226 million bushels; 1880, 496½ million; in 1889, 409½ (dropping to 399 million in 1890 but advancing to 612 millions in 1891.) 522 millions in 1900, and 655 million in 1910; though even higher records were made in 1901, 748 million bushels, and 1906, 735 million.

Much has been said about the low product per acre of wheat in the United States when compared with that in European countries and it is doubtless true that wheat production in certain countries of Europe, where great attention is given to the care of the land and the supply of proper soil foods, is greater per acre than in the United States. On the other hand, however, it is equally true and interesting that the yield per acre in the United States is increasing, having averaged 15.8 bushels per acre in 1909 against 14 bushels per acre in 1907 and 1908, 12½ bushels in 1904, 13 bushels in 1894, and 10½ bushels in 1885. While the production per acre of course fluctuates from year to year, the average production per acre during recent years has clearly been higher than the average for the last decade or two. This slight increase in the quantity, coupled with the material advance in price, brought the average farm value per acre for 1909 up to \$15.62 per acre, against an average of about half that figure in the period from 1890 to 1900.

Meantime the quantity of wheat retained for domestic consumption has greatly increased, while the quantity exported has been reduced. In the fiscal year 1910 the quantity retained for consumption was 650 million bushels, being larger than in any earlier year; and the quantity exported, 87 million, which was less than in any fiscal year since 1877, with the single exception of 1905, when only 44 million bushels were exported. In 1908 the exports aggregated 163 million bushels, and in 1902, the high record year in wheat exportations, 235 million.

Prices of wheat since 1904 show a material advance over those of the preceding decade, the domestic quotation of No. 2, red winter, in New York market being, according to the Bureau of Statistics, \$1.25 in 1909 and \$1.05 in 1908, while in no year from 1892 to 1903 was the average as much as \$1.00, but ranging down as low as 61c per bushel in 1894, 80c in 1901, and 85c in 1903. The export price which averaged 72c, in the fiscal year 1900, 81c in 1904, 99c in 1908, and \$1.02 in 1909, only touched the \$1.00 price in August and September of the current year, 90c in March, 92c in April, and for the 11 months ending with May averaged 93c per bushel.

ONE PRICE ON LORD'S CODE

Secretary of State Olcott has informed the Bancroft-Whitney company of Portland, publishers and dealers in law books that hereafter no trade discount will be allowed for Lord's Oregon Code.

It has been customary in the past to allow a discount on purchases of more than 50 books and the company has taken advantage of this for several years. To print the books costs the state \$3.83, while the books are fixed by statute to sell at \$3.50, or 33 cents less than the cost of production. Here is a case where the more money the state publishes the more money is lost and this loss has been augmented in the past by allowing the trade discount on more than 50 books.

Secretary of State Olcott in conformity with his avowed policy to cut down expenses everywhere it is possible, has decided to patch up the leak from this source as much as he can and hereafter the books will not be sold at less than the price presented by law.

The book company has remonstrated with the secretary's office over this new move but Secretary Olcott is firm and like President Taft, when once his mind is set, is as stubborn as a mule. The discount price has been \$2.80.
