Secretary of State Olcott has informed the Bancroft-Whitney company of Portland, publishers and dealers in law books that hereatfer no trade discount will be allowed for Lord's Oregon Code.

It has been customary in the past to allow a discount on purchases of more than 50 books and the company has taken advantage of this for several years. To print the books costs the new shoes feel casy. It is a certain cure for state \$3.83, while the books are fixed sweating callous, swollen, tired, acting feet by statute to sell at \$3.50, or 33 cents less than the cost of production. Here is a case where the more books the state publishes the more money is lost and this loss has been augumented in the past by allowing the trade discount on more than 50 books.

Secretary of State Olcott in conformity with his avowed policy to cut down expenses everywhere it is possible, has decided to patch up the leak from this source as much as he can and hereafter the books will not be sold at less than the price presented
