Information for the escheat of the

property of the estate of William Bahnsen, deceased, having been filed

in the above entitled court and cause

by D. V. Kuykendall, district attorney

of the second prosecuting attorney

district, the same being the thirteenth

judicial district of the State of Oregon,

said information alleging that on the

7th day of January, 1911, the then

acting Governor of the State of Oregon,

directed the said district attorney to file said information; that

William Bahnsen, deceased, was the

last person lawfully seized of the fol-

lowing described real property situated

in Lake County, State of Oregon, to wit: Beginning thirty feet east

of the northeast corner of block 3, in

the town of Lakeview, Lake County,

Oregon, and running thence north

forty-five feet; thence east forty-five

feet; thence south forty-five feet;

thence west forty-five feet to the place

of beginning situate in section fifteen,

township thirty nine, south of range

twenty, E. W. M., that said William Bahnsen was at the time of his death

the owner of a large amount of per-

sonal property consisting of money,

certificates of deposit, household fur-

niture and mining stock valued in the

aggregate \$1250.00; that said William Bahnsen died intestate in Lake County, Oregon, on the 29th day of Au-

gust, 1905, leaving no heirs, widow,

children or no kindred capable of in-

heriting any of the property, and that

said property and the title thereto

has escheated and vested in the State

of Oregon, that on the 2nd day of

September, 1905, letters of administra-

tion of said estate duly issued under

the seal of said court to said Dick J.

Wilcox; that said Dick J. Wilcox

thereafter duly qualified as such ad-

ministrator and took possession of the

effects and property of said estate

and such proceedings were thereafter

had in such court that all claims

against said estate and all expenses

of administration of said estate is finally

and fully settled; and the said ad-

ministrator has filed his final account

of the administration of said estate in

said County Court, and that said final

account was in all things approved

by the judge of said court on the 26th

day of May, 1911, and said court found

and decreed that said William Bahnsen

died intestate and left no heir or heirs

at law surviving, but that said per-

sonal property escheated to the state

of Oregon; that in the order approv-

ing said final account said county

court decreed that said administrator

deliver over the possession of all of

said property remaining unappropriated

and unclaimed in his hands to the

clerk of said county court; that F. W. Payne is the clerk of said county

court and claims no interest in any of

the property of said estate; that Dick J. Wilcox either as administrator or

otherwise claims no interest in any

of the property of said estate, and

that no other person or persons claim

any interest or right in said estate or

the property thereof; that the per-

sonal property of said estate is in the

possession of F. W. Payne, as clerk of

the county court of Lake County, Oregon,

and the real property of said estate

is in the possession of Dick J.

Wilcox, as administrator of the estate

of William Bahnsen, deceased; and

that said real property is at this time

unoccupied, it is ordered that all per-

sons interested in the estate of the

above-named William Bahnsen, de-

ceased, are hereby required to appear

in the above-entitled court on or be-

fore the 1st day of September, 1911,

and show cause, if any they have,

why the title to all of the above de-

scribed property and all of the prop-

erty of the estate of the said William

Bahnsen, deceased, should not vest in

the state of Oregon. It is further or-

dered that this order shall be pub-

lished for at least six successive weeks

from the date thereof in the Lake

County Examiner, a newspaper of gen-

eral circulation, published in Lake

county, state of Oregon.

Alturas Plaindealer: We had the pleasure this week of meeting Joe Lane of Lakeview, grandson and namesake of the "Marion" of the Mexican War, Governor of Oregon, delegate in Congress from that Territory, Senator and later candidate for the Breckinridge ticket for Vice-President. When the Civil war came Gen. Lane was offered a Major General's commission in the Confederate army. Like the true patriot that he was, he declined both, saying he would "never draw a sword where his countrymen were his foes."

Had all of our countrymen been actuated by that spirit of patriotism, there would have been no Confederate army, and no use of a Federal army, and one of the most cruel, bloody and devastating wars of modern times averted.
