Cruelty to Animals
John Brooks and Andrew Kester were held last week by Justice Bailey to appear before the next grand jury to answer to a charge of cruelty to animals. The horse belonged to W. B. Card and is of a balky disposition.

Brooks and Kester had hired the animal to work in the hay field, but the horse refused to work, whereupon a chain was placed around his body and drawn between his forelegs. A team was hitched to it and the animal was quite seriously injured in the resultant procedure. Mr. Card thereupon swore out a warrant for their arrest with the result above stated, their bonds being fixed at \$20 each. The penalty for the crime ranges from \$200 fine to imprisonment for one year.
