## OREGON EASTERN WORK COMMENCES

The Vale Enterprise has the following on the railroad situation for this week:

A large work train and gang of laborers will be at work filling in the local railroad yards early next week. The steam shovel which has been lying idle in the yards for the past week will be taken up the Boran line to a point 9 miles above this city where tons of gravel and dirt are to be hauled by the special work train to the local yards. The fill is to average from two and a half feet to four feet high and will extend from the new passenger depot on west to the county road.

Engineer E. E. Grimes, of Salt Lake, an assistant to Chief Engineer Carl Stradley, arrived in Vale Thursday to take charge of the work. When seen about the proposed work Mr. Grimes stated that "the work would be started in the immediate future" which is one of the most common expressions of the railroader when he doesn't care to say very much.

However, Mr. Grimes later in the conversation stated that the work would be under taken early next week and pushed to completion as fast as possible.

This, however, depends upon the size of the work train crew that can be secured.

Little could be learned as to further railroad work from this point, as all railroad men are working away according to instructions and saying little. Engineer Grimes is here to stay and to prepare the job for the big crews that are to be sent, and it is believed that the work of the building of the Oregon Eastern is to be undertaken upon the completion of the local yards. According to plans and specifications laid out for the yards, several miles of tracks are to be put down for switching facilities in order that the vast amount of material necessary for the Oregon Eastern railroad work can be handled properly.

That actual railroad construction work into the interior country from Vale is only a matter of a few weeks is now certain since numerous railroad men have been invading this territory during the past few weeks. Several reports on conditions of the country, especially of the Malheur canyon, have been made to headquarters by men who have spent several weeks here and over the proposed route. Gordon Guntill, of the right of way department of the Oregon Short Line, with headquarters in Salt Lake, has been digging into the records of the local court house for the past two weeks. All his efforts are centralized in looking up the property owners of the land along the route of the Oregon Eastern and it is believed that his work is one of the last steps before bringing a large number of condemnation suits into the coming term of circuit court.

From the most reliable sources also comes the news of the location of sites for railroad construction comes throughout the Malheur canyon during the past week. A Utah construction company representative arrived in this city on the 12th, spent a week in the canyon, and returned to this city last Saturday. At different times until last Thursday, when he left for headquarters in Ogden, he was seen conversing with other mysterious railroaders in town and during such talks considerable important news was gathered that substantiates all former reports of early work on the Oregon Eastern railroad.

### CURIOUS COLOR NAMES.

There Was Once an Extensive Group of Flea Shades.

"Flea," which was for a long time the name given an exceedingly popular hue, is when translated from the French simply "flea." It appears that the accidental admission of a flea at a court festivity in France and the subsequent discovery and capture of the uninvited guest gave rise to a host of jokes and anecdotes, and so a new color was jocularly named in the insect's honor. Indeed, there was an extensive group of flea shades—old flea, young flea, flea's foot, lively flea and others. Flea, which was a kind of drab, is still familiar to the reading public through its frequent mention in literature, drama and letters of noted personages in the past.

### SLIPS IN WRITING.

Curious Blunders Made by Reporters and Correspondents.

This one might have been due to an error in typewriting: "The girl was afflicted with typhoid fever."

A correspondent in a small town on Long Island, evidently laboring under great excitement, wired, "Mrs. George K. Blank was the heroine of the holocaust." (She played a garden hose on a burning barn.) In further describing the blaze he said, "The flames swept into furious environment."—New York World.

### How Eggs Are Hatched in China.

There is in China a curious method of hatching eggs. First the eggs are placed in tiers in a large basket, twice the size of an ordinary barrel, which is thickly lined with hay and carefully closed from the air by a tight fitting cover of twisted straw. In three days' time the eggs are taken out and replaced in a different order, those at the surface being put in the lower tier. This is repeated every third day for a fortnight, when the eggs are removed from the basket and placed on a shelf in another room, being carefully covered with bran. In a day or two the chickens chip the shells and make their appearance into the world. The success of this method is attributed to the fact that the animal heat of the egg, being retained by the basket, which is formed of material not conducting caloric, is sufficient to support animal life and develop it.—Detroit Free Press.

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
