\$30,000,000 FOR STATE FROM LAKE

Our Borax and Salt Deposits Promise Big Revenue

And now Lake County is having more notoriety thrust upon her by reason of the borax and salt deposits. Relative thereto a special dispatch from Salem to the Oregonian says: "Development of sodium chloride and other salt deposits on the basis of a proposition to yield \$30,000,000 to the irreducible school fund of the state by the lease of three Lake county lakes is a proposition put up to the state through Attorney General Crawford by C. M. Sain and associates of Portland. According to a recent report of State Engineer Lewis these lakes contain a most fabulous wealth in sodium deposits which approximate many hundreds of millions of dollars if properly developed. An exhaustive examination of the resources of these lakes has been made and following the examination indications point to resources of enormous value.

"According to the proposition which has been made to the state Mr. Sain promises to lease from the state Summer, Albert, and Alkali Lakes and pay the state a royalty of 5 cents per ton on sodium chloride or common table salts and \$1 a ton on all other salts. If the state prefers he says he will pay a royalty of 10 per cent on the net proceeds from the sale of salts, the lease to run 40 years, 100,000 tons of salt to be ready for shipment and market by October 13, 1913."

A salt deposit over in Warner has been worked for many years, and annually many tons are brought to Lakeview where it is sold to stockmen. As yet the borax deposits have not found a market, owing no doubt to the high cost of transportation. When they become of commercial value, which they will probably be in the near future, they will no doubt become famous for the deposits are very extensive.

However, if reports are true, they are likely to prove a source of litigation, for while private individuals claim them it is understood that the State alleges that all such lands have been ceded to it, and it is therefore likely to dispute the claims of individuals.

Bank for Paisley

Chevaucan Press: It is possible to asset positively that Paisley is to have a bank. The Press has known for several weeks that plans were afoot for the establishment of such an institution in our midst, but hesitated to make the matter public until it was finally assured. This is now the case and we may congratulate ourselves upon securing an addition to the business institutions of the town that will not only facilitate the transaction of business here but will mean that Paisley will be the depository of the wealth of our adjacent valleys, instead of towns far distant.

Capitalists from Bend and even from Oklahoma were instrumental in promoting the bank and local money is also enlisted in the enterprise. A site

has been secured upon which it is intended to erect a substantial and handsome stone building, one that will be a credit to the town. The president and cashier of the bank will also live in Paisley and will probably erect handsome residences.

Had we entertained any doubt that Paisley had a great future this news would settle the question to our mind beyond dispute. When capital begins to come in, we may rest assured that the other desirable things will follow in its wake. So get your money out of that old sock and get it in the bank.

Land Suit Settled

A sigh of relief has gone up from a good many people in Lake County during the past week because of the

long-drawn-out Warner Valley land troubles having been settled, as was stated in the last issue of the Examiner.

Under the terms of the compromise the state will receive 4000 acres, the settlers 2600 acres and the company approximately 14,000 acres. In addition the company has agreed to waive its right of reversion of \$1 an acre or approximately \$6000 which was paid to the state for the land. The company also agrees to withdraw all litigation and pay all costs.

The Warner Valley trouble dates from over 20 years ago, when Henry, or "Swamp Angel," Owen filed on immense tracts of land in Lake County. Litigation started when J. L. Morrow, of Adel, with several other settlers, asked that a suit be brought

to give the settlers some certainty as to their title. This suit was brought, but the Supreme Court held that the state could not maintain a suit for private taxpayers and the case was thrown out of court.

Another suit was started to secure possession of the lands on alleged irregularities which were alleged to have been committed when the lands were secured. The Supreme Court ruled on a portion of this difficulty, dividing certain parcels of the land and sending the remainder back to the lower court for further litigation. As a result neither the state nor the company was certain as to the eventual outcome, and this is the way the compromise came up. A compromise was attempted before the last Legislature, but the plan was withdrawn on the advice of

the Governor before it came to a final vote in the senate.

A Good Rancher

The way things grow on the West Side is surely a caution. Last Saturday Joe Ambrose brought in samples of wheat, oats, sugarbeets, kale, rutabagas, etc., that could scarcely be excelled anywhere. The wheat is fully 4 feet in height, the heads being long and well filled. As a general thing oats do not do well on the West Side, but those grown by Mr. Ambrose while not yet ripe seem to be well developed and no doubt will produce a good crop. All of the vegetables are of large size and will produce immensely. The products are now at the Examiner office where they may be seen by any "doubting Thomases."
