WETS IN NORTHERN LAKE ARE THIRSTY

Ask For Special Election to Consider Liquor Question

The County Court has been in session this week, and a large amount of business is up for consideration. Perhaps that which is attracting most attention is the petition from the northern part of the county for a special election to be held for the purpose of voting on the liquor question in the dry precincts. The question is one not easy of solution and it has therefore been put up to the Attorney General. It seems that the proposition of incorporating the town of Paisley, which is situated in one of the precincts referred to, has a direct bearing on the cause, as the voters in that town will be included in case the election is held, and if the town is incorporated all voters therein will be ineligible to vote at the special election. If it were not for the incorporation of Paisley the question would be dead easy, but while the call for the special election would be legal yet before the election could be held Paisley will have no doubt become an incorporated town, thereby invalidating the special election to be held in that and other precincts. Hence the Court has deferred action on the petition until advised as to the proper course by the Attorney General.

persons who desire to conduct saloons in the dry portion of Lake county. Enough signatures to these papers have been obtained, say the circulators, to insure an election; and unless the dry advocates are able to pick some technical flaw in the documents or find some clause in the law whereby they may block an election at this time, the question will undoubtedly be put up to the voters.

More than half the voters in and near Paisley, declare the wets, have signed the petitions and, it is said, Silver Lake made almost the same showing. But, there is little in the number of signatures to show which way the pendulum will swing on election day. Those who are backing the petitions say they made a thorough canvass of the voters before starting the fight and that they are sure of enough votes to switch Silver Lake back to the wet ranks. The more radical ones of the temperance workers are just as confident that Northern Lake County will remain dry.

If the wets win, this county will collect between \$1,500 and \$3,000 additional annual saloon license. There will be at least four and probably five saloons in four towns to seek license and each must pay \$400 a year.

Should Silver Lake vote wet it is up to the people of the community to see that all saloons are conducted orderly and in accordance with the law. There will be at least one consolation for the drys:—Bootleggers and others who have sold intoxicants without regard for law or license will be driven out of business, and if the saloons are conducted as a nuisance they may be prosecuted and closed as such. Almost any system will be a relief from the present one under which it is just as easy for men to buy whiskey here as it would be if there was a licensed saloon in town.

FLEEING DOCTOR ARRESTED HERE

San Francisco Physician Captured by Sheriff W. B. Snider

Dr. J. Grant Lyman and L. D. Thornett Thursday evening last were arrested by Sheriff W. B. Snider on telegraphic instructions from United States Marshal Elliott of San Francisco. The doctor and Thornett were traveling in an automobile driven by H. V. Merle, and owing to tire trouble they had driven into the Southstone garage for repairs. Lyman and Merle were at once placed under arrest, but Thornett escaped when he saw what was going on but later on went to the jail to consult with the doctor, and it was there that he was apprehended. Thornett was the only one that was armed, and none of the party made any attempt whatever to resist the sheriff. Merle was subsequently released on his own recognizance, but the other two were taken to Klamath Falls to appear for examination before U. S. Commissioner Richardson.

Dr. Lyman is wanted on a charge of misuse of the mails in connection with real estate deals. He was first arrested in San Francisco on September 8 by Postal Inspector Madeira on charges made by scores of Los Angeles investors who allege that the wily doctor had fleeced them out of \$50,000 on a fraudulent stock scheme for which he used the mails.

Four days after his arrest Lyman attempted to escape from United States Deputy Marshal Fitzgerald on Market Street. The prisoner made a dash for a passing car, with Fitzgerald at his heels. The promoter crashed his foot against the car step, snapping the tendons of his foot and ankle. He was then ordered to the Providence Hospital to undergo treatment under Federal guard.

Lyman then made an escape from the hospital by bribing his guard, took an auto in waiting and made his way to Marysville, where he secured Merle to take him to Shasta Springs, engaging him for a week. The story he told Merle was to the effect that his wife was endeavoring to have him confined in an asylum in order to secure control of his wealth, and the trip was made to escape her. Thornett was the night attendant at the hospital where Lyman was under guard, and it was through him that the doctor bargained for his escape.

On leaving Marysville the party went to Vina, near Chico, and remained Monday night; then to Montgomery Creek Tuesday night. Adin Wednesday night, took lunch at Alturas Thursday noon and reached Lakeview the same evening where they were arrested.

Thornett's visit to the jail was no doubt made in the hope of being able to aid the doctor in making his escape, for after being taken into custody he stated that he did not think he would be recognized. A reward of \$300 was offered for the capture of the party, and Sheriff Snider will receive that amount.

Friday morning Sheriff Snider took the prisoners to Bly, where he delivered them to Deputy Marshal Arnerich.

Relative to their arrival at Klamath Falls the Pioneer Press says:

POSTAL SAVINGS BANK FOR ALTURAS

Uncle Sam to Establish Bank in Neighboring Town Oct. 17

Alturas New Era: Postmaster Jas. T. Nealey informs us that on October 17th, 1911 a postal savings bank will be established in Alturas.

Accounts may be entered by any person ten years of age or over in his or her name, and by a married woman in her own name, free from interference or control by her husband. No person can have more than one account at any one time. After opening an account a depositor may forward subsequent deposits to the postoffice by mail.

No account will be opened for less than one dollar, and no person is permitted to deposit more than \$100 in any one calendar month, nor to have a balance to his credit at any one time of more than \$500.

Interest will be allowed on all deposits at the rate of 2 per cent per annum, if the money remains on deposit for at least a year.

This will be a benefit to the people of moderate means and especially to children, as it will be the means of their saving their money and seeing it where it will draw interest. All who are interested can obtain complete information from Postmaster Nealey in regard to the same.

Sixth street and starting down Main the doctor began to call for an attorney and claimed that he was being kidnaped by Marshal Arnerich. The machine stopped in front of the Court House and a crowd soon gathered to learn what was really up. The truth soon leaked out and while the loud protestations of the doctor and his companion at the alleged high-handed methods of the marshal caused some to sympathize with the prisoners the general sentiment was with the officer.

Attorney Stone appeared on the scene and was immediately employed by the doctor to handle his case. United States Commissioner Richardson was appealed to, the officer wanting to take the men on to California on the evening train but after talking with the attorney and commissioner he agreed to allow the men to have their way and leave the matter up to Mr. Richardson to settle. The prisoners were taken from the car and placed in jail to await further action by the commissioner.

In a statement Dr. Lyman said that he simply wanted a fair show. If he is guilty of any crime, he says he does not object to returning to face his accusers but that he does object to being rushed through the country without a chance of seeing a lawyer. He claims, and this claim is substantiated by Chauffer Clapp, that the officer attempted to get the automobile man to take them directly to the depot and to arrange to get there just a few minutes before the departure of the train so he could get his prisoners off last evening without giving them any chance to see an attorney here. The chauffer refused to do this but drove on into the city.

No Special Session

Salem, Ore., Sept. 29.—There will be no special session of the Legislature called to make good roads laws. This ultimatum was announced this morning by Governor West, who stated that, inasmuch as the general public is not in favor of calling a special session, and the people of the entire state should enact good roads laws, if so desiring, through the initiative, he could find no justification for the Legislature to meet out of the regular session. Governor West stated that the only petitions for the special session came from Hood River, and very few requests have been made to him by the champions of good roads in Oregon. As the matter is of vital interest to every citizen in the state and it is the citizens' right to have full supervision of the good roads problems, he announced that the special session would hardly be practicable at this time, and that the questions should be settled by the people at the next general election.

Although not directly informed, the Governor said the Highway Commission appointed by him will no doubt submit the bills they have drafted to a vote of the people, and there is a possibility of many more such measures being filed before the next election, bearing directly upon good roads matters.
