Judge L. T. Harris, of Eugene, who has been mentioned as a possible candidate for United States Senator, declines to enter the campaign. He has given out a statement to the effect that he has no aspirations in that direction whatever at the present time.

Why should a person who did not hear the evidence and knows nothing of the law be qualified to pass upon the act of a judge of a court in making a decision? It seems strange that any one should favor the recall of the judiciary, knowing how changeable public opinion is on certain occasions.

Some of the large timber owners have conferred with State Game Warden Finley with the view of throwing large tracts of timber land into the game preserve. As a result, it is believed, the area over which hunters can follow the sport of deer killing will be greatly lessened. It is expected that there will be some preserves established in both Coos and Curry counties. Timber holders claim that many of the forest fires are due to the carelessness of hunters and by having their lands added to the preserves they will protect their timber from fires.

After exhaustive tests the Department of Agriculture has decided the marsh lands on Lower Klamath Lake to be practically valueless for crop production, on account of the presence of alkaline salts chiefly carbonate of sodium. In a report just issued by the bureau of plant industry which has been conducting practical experiments on these lands for the past three years, the conclusion is reached that "on account of the highly impervious character of the soil of this marsh land, the leaching out of the alkaline salts is rendered very difficult and appears to be impractical by any method at present known. The expense would exceed the preservative values of the land." The report also calls attention to the fact that the air-drainage conditions on the Klamath marsh lands are such that low temperatures and killing frosts are likely to occur every month in the year, thus limiting the possible agriculture of the hardier species of crops.

While the passion for investigation shown by the Democrats at the special session is certain to have a salutary effect on the various officials of the Government who may have been lax in their methods of administration, it has been a great boon to the official reporters who have had all the work they could handle. A stenographer who takes testimony for one hour daily at a hearing, like the steel or sugar bearings, will make \$25 a day. In addition to extra fees he will charge to witnesses or others who want copies of their testimony before he gets his notes written up; and the thrifty stenographer is never in a hurry to write up his notes before all such side revenues are gathered in. It will be seen, from this, that merely the taking and printing of the proceedings in the various investigations will cost the country many thousands of dollars. But the country has had a vast amount of entertainment out of it and for that alone, the investigations are doubtless well worth the price.

The Bend Bulletin has recently completed a political census amongst the country press of Oregon and finds an almost unanimous opinion that Wilson will receive the state's support for the Democratic presidential nomination, the probability that Taft will carry the state, and the fact that more than half of Oregon press is of the opinion that neither Chamberlain nor Bourne can be reelected if he tried. Furthermore, West is picked by the majority of the papers to succeed Chamberlain, while Ellis, Malarkey and Lowell run about even as choice of successor to Bourne, should the Senator drop out, with one paper opining that Lafferty may fill the bill "if he gets the girl." In the presidential race, out of 70 papers having definite opinions, more than 50 say Taft will receive the Republican nomination, 40 state their certainty that he will win in the state, and about 10 believe La Follette will get the nomination; 50 pick Wilson for Democratic candidate, 13 of these counting on him to carry Oregon, against Taft, while a scant half dozen see a chance at the nomination of Harmon, while none see chance of victory for the Ohio Judge, an opinion shared by the three only Folk supporters.

**Big Tax Sale**  
In the next issue of the Examiner will appear the delinquent tax sale of Lake County for 1911. A large number of Oregon Valley contract holders have failed to pay their taxes, and the list is quite extended in consequence thereof. Persons not familiar with conditions would conclude that financial conditions hereabouts are in bad shape but such is not the case, for with very few exceptions the delinquent taxpayers are residents of other states.

**"Wets" Found Guilty**  
C. W. Kinney, of Lookout, and Farley Auble, of Adin, were this week convicted of selling liquor without a license. They were given a jury trial before the Justice of the Peace at Adin. It is stated that the barkeeper in Auble's employ turned state's evidence. Both places are said to have had licenses from Uncle Sam for the sale of spirituous liquors. The cases have engendered much feeling in the neighborhood.

The bank opened last week and the first day's deposits aggregate \$25,000. Taft is located in the oil district and is a place of much importance.
