Lakeview, Oregon, Thursday, November 2, 1911

President Tatt Monday issued his Thanksgiving proclamation, setting the date for the last Thursday in the month, the 30th inst.

The rejected new charter of Salem, Oregon with it the establishment of the commission form of government, was voted down at the election held last week called for that purpose, by a vote of 736 against the change to 885 for the new charter, or nearly two to one. The fight against the change was headed by some of the leading men of the city, who found fault with the proposed charter, among those opposing it were Justice George H. Johnson, former member of the Supreme Court, who fought the charter for its alleged weaknesses. One of the objections raised to the proposed charter was the absence of a provision to select candidates.

Reports from the northern part of the county are to the effect that the "wets" are likely to carry the election next Tuesday. As is pretty generally known, the local option law has proved a failure in Lake county, that is so far as prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors in the dry precincts is concerned, and it seems that the liquor business can be better controlled under a license system than otherwise. With the exception of the Bige Archie case, nearly all the criminal business before the Circuit Court at the present time is from dry precincts, and while of course the result might have been the same had licensed saloons existed in the precincts, yet nevertheless, the crimes committed are traceable directly to blind ones.

WEST PLANS TO BUILD HIGHWAY

Plans to start immediately on a road from the state asylum to the penitentiary have been formulated by Governor West. He will have asylum patients and convicts do the work.

The road will be built of the most improved type, with a solid foundation of crushed rock, and, according to the governor's plan, will be the first of a network of intercommunicating highways between the various state institutions.

Not a penny will be asked from the county court. The governor said last night he was sure what little money would be needed to carry necessary expenses would be gotten from the Salem Board of Trade and from progressive merchants.

A loan of forty mules has been secured from Porter Brothers, of Portland and a rock crusher will be furnished by John S. Beal, also of Portland. A quarry near the asylum farm will be opened from which the rock will be procured. It will be necessary to get a traction engine to furnish power. There are hopes that the use of one will be offered by some one who has a good engine that is not at work at this season of the year.

Laws of the 1911 Session.

The taxes on the following advertised real property became delinquent on April 4, 1911, and are subject to a penalty of 10 per cent, and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum until they shall have been paid.

Any day after the expiration of six months after the taxes charged against the following real property are delinquent the holder is authorized, upon demand of any person making application, to issue to them a certificate of delinquency upon payment of the tax, penalty, interest and cost of advertising.

Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until relieved at the rate of 15 per cent per annum.
