PRICES ADVANCE ALL OVER WORLD

That prices have advanced in parts of the world as well as in the United States is evidenced by a statement prepared by the Bureau of Statistics, Department of Commerce and Labor, comparing import prices at the present time with those of certain earlier years. The import figures of the United States government represent, under existing law and regulations, the prices of the articles in question in the wholesale markets of the country from which imported, and a comparison, therefore, of the average import prices of the principle articles imported at the present time compared with those of corresponding periods in earlier years indicates, in some degree at least, fluctuation in prices in the countries from which these articles are imported.

This comparison of prices is rendered practicable by the reason of the fact that the Bureau of Statistics publishes in its Summary of Commerce and Finance a table showing the monthly average import prices of the principle articles brought into the country, and states at the head of the table that "The value of the goods represents their value in the foreign markets." These statements of average import prices are obtained by comparing quantity with value for the period in question, or in other words, by dividing the stated quantity of the article under consideration into the stated value thereof and thus determining the import value per unit of quantity. This table shows, for example, the average price of coffee imported in August, 1911, as 11.8c per pound, against 6.4c per pound in August, 1901, a decade ago; india rubber, an average of 8.4c per pound in August, 1911, against 46.9c per pound in August 1901; clothing wool, 22.9c per pound in August, 1911, against 12c per pound in August, 1901; combing wool, 33.9c per pound in August of the present year, against 19.8c in August a decade ago; flax, \$438.65 per ton in August, 1911, against \$216.82 in August, 1901; hemp, \$210.10 per ton in August of the present year, against \$165.61 in August, 1901; tin plates, 3.9c per pound in August of the current year, against 3c in the corresponding month a decade ago; tin in bars, blocks, etc., 14.2c per pound in August, 1911, against 25.5c a pound in August, 1901; and tea, 12.2c a pound in August of the current year, against 13.3c a pound in the corresponding month a decade ago.

English of Long Ago.

The king's English has changed as kings have come and gone, says the St. James' Gazette. Here is a passage from the record of a crowning of long ago: "The Cardinal, as Archbishop of Canterbury, showing the king to the people at the high parties of the said pulpit, shall say in this wise, 'Sirs, I here present Henry (true and right), and undoubted inheritor by the laws of God and man to the coronet and royal dignity of England, with all things thereto annexed and appertaining, elect, chosen and required by all three estates of the same land to tak upon him the said coronet and royal dignity, whereupon ye shall understand that the date is prefixed and appoynted by all the peers of this land for the consecration, enveccion and coronacion of the said most excellent Prince Henry; will ye, sirs, at this tyme geve your wifes and essentes to the same consecration, enveccion and coronacion? Whereupon the people shall say, with a greute voice, 'Ye, Ye. So be hit, King Henry! King Henry!'"

Weighing the Mayor.

A mayor, particularly an English mayor, is traditionally a man of weight and substance, but there is only one municipality that insists that his honor get on the public scales and prove it. Of the thousands of quaint and curious customs surviving in "the old country" this is perhaps one of the most odd. The mayor of High Wycombe has to be weighed on Nov. 9 of each year, inauguration day, and this custom has been observed for about six centuries. The mayor elect walks at the head of a procession consisting of the councilors, the bandle and the mace bearer. He is clad in cocked hat, silk stockings, blue coat and knee breeches. Upon reaching the town hall the mayor is placed upon the scales by the head constable, and a record of his avoirdupois is solemnly made in a book kept for this purpose.—Harper's Weekly.
