STATE TO VOTE ON CHANGE OF RECALL WOOL GROWERS TO MEET NEXT WEE

Through the People's Power League the initiative in the general election qual Convention. next year, submitting the essential provisions of the recall as it was amendment is now in the hands of a 1911. special committee, representing the organization which will advocate its adoption.

The recall as applied in California differs essentially from the Oregon plan differs in two important particutars. In the first place the majority vote is required under the California statute before an erring official can be recalled, and, secondly, when a majority of the eletors have declared for the recall of an official, he is eliminated from further consideration and not become a candidate to succeed himself.

Under the California plan, the recall of an official is submitted as two distinct propositions, both appearing on the same ballot. When a petition, signed by the requisite number of electors. is presented demanding the recall of an official, there is printed on the official ballot the question: "Shall John Jones be recalled?" Spaces for the elector to indicate a "yes" or a "no" vote are provided. In another place on the same ballot are printed the names of the candidates aspiring to succeed the man against whom the recall is directed. If a majority of the electors in the election vote for the recall of the official, his recall is accompilshed, and at the same time he is eliminated as a candidate to succeed himself, since the question of his recall and the election of his successor is determined in the same election. If a majority vote to recall nim, then the candidate for the office receiving the greatest number of votes succeeds to the office for the remainder of the term. On the other hand, if a majority vote against the recall of the official then he retains his office and the vote on the several aspirants to succeed him is not taken into

The improvement contended for the California statute over the Oregon method lies in the fact that a majority vote is required before an official can be recalled.

Under the Oregon plan, a majority vote is not necessary to recall an official. When the proper recall petition has been filed, the official against

the recall petition was filed. was defeated by James Maguire by a margin of only 22 votes. In this election Maguire received only 29 per cent of the total vote cast. Virtually the same percentage of the total vote was received by Ellis. At the same time there was no direct expression on the part of the majority of voters as to
