POLITICAL BEES HUM IN KLAMATH

Judge Baldwin Mentioned as Aspirant for Congress

Here is the substance of a resume of the political situation from Portland: "In the second district, embracing all of the counties east of the Cascades, John (Jerry) P. Rusk, of La Grande, thus far in the campaign appears to be the most aggressive candidate. Rusk, however, will not be without opposition, the names of not less than a dozen other favored sons of Eastern Oregon having been proposed as the right sort of Congressional timber, including Judge Geo. T. Baldwin, of Klamath Falls. In any event, the contest in that district will be an interesting one. If the field becomes too congested with candidates it is regarded as more than a probability by those acquainted with the political situation in that section of the state that W. R. Ellis, ex-Representative, may get into the fight with an idea of landing the nomination with the opposition divided among three or four contestants who are already in prospect. "The only avowed opponent of Representative Hawley, who seeks reelection from the First District, is George C. Brownell, of Oregon City, Walter A. Dumick, State Senator from Clackamas County, is regarded a possible candidate against Hawley. Another possibility is George F. Rodgers, an ex-Mayor of Salem, but Rodgers does not enthuse over the idea as much as some of his friends would like to have him."

ed into the living room by Mrs. Withers, where a few moments were pleasantly spent beside a bright fire in the open fireplace, and on their departure the party was given a fine lot of apples which they greatly enjoyed on their way home.

The return trip was made on the east side of Chewaucan valley, dinner being taken at the White House, owned

by the ZX company, of which F. A. Fitzpatrick is the manager. Mrs. Richmond was in charge of the culinary department, and she certainly understands her business. In addition to the usual bread-meat-and-potato diet one usually expects to find at stouping places, there were so many good things that several members of the party came near remaining for another meal. Numerous kinds of vegetables were served, which together with the rich brown gravy from the meat made a most appetizing meal. And when to that was added other attractive dishes, such as stewed fruit, mince pie, apple dumplings, with rich cream such as is only to be had in the country—then it was that Mr. Watson gave up, but not so with the Examiner scribe. He proceeded to do justice to the meal, although in so doing he did injustice to himself, as he afterwards learned, for he experienced a deep-seated pain for several hours thereafter.

After dinner a visit was paid to the dipping vat, where cattle were being "doctored" for the scab. J. E. McCool, of Lakeview, is superintending the work, and it is carried on most expeditiously, about 800 head having been put through the dipping process Saturday.

From the White House to the Hotchkiss ranch at the falls of the Chewaucan, a distance of some 12 or 15 miles, the road is perfect. It is level, smooth, hard and devoid of dust, and by eliminating the curves it would be possible to drive at the highest speed. After leaving the Hotchkiss ranch, Valley Falls is quickly reached and from there on up through Crooked Creek th ridge is delightful. The road runs through and alongside of fine farms, and to one who has never been through the country it is indeed a revelation. At the White House Geo. Downs joined the party, and Lakeview was reached at 4 o'clock.

It was the most delightful trip that the Examiner family has enjoyed during their stay in Lakeview and one that will be long remembered not only for the pleasures of the trip but for the knowledge gained of the actual conditions in this part of Lake County.

Land Office Business

As an indication of the amount of work transacted in the local Land Office the following summary of the report for October will be of interest. Applications—50 homesteads, of which 23 were allowed, 19 were rejected and 8 suspended; 12 deserts, 10 allowed and 2 suspended; 9 timber and stone, 7 allowed and 2 suspended; 1 water right application. Five leaves of absences were applied for, 3 allowed and 2 rejected. Two applications for amendment were filed.

There were 18 homestead proofs made 7 annual deserts land 17 timber and stone.

There were 12 state selections, 1 forest lieu selection and 16 reimbursements.

There were 91 entries of all classes made, 4 cancellations, 2 five-year and 34 expiration notices issued, 14 entries reported for cancellation, 412 miscellaneous letters answered and 58 official letters acted upon.

Fire at Klamath Falls

Klamath Falls had three incendiary fires Monday night, one destroying the old planing mill of J. F. Goeller & Son and causing a loss of \$4000. Several hundred cords of wood belonging to C. D. Willson were also burned. The Wieland Bottling works near the depot were also set afire but it was discovered before much damage resulted. The third fire was in some baled hay stored a block south of the public school. There is no clue to the perpetrators.
