Those interested in the breeding and raising of horses, mares, dairy cattle, sheep, and beef cattle will be given opportunity to get the greatest amount of scientific instruction in the shortest possible time this winter in the short course of the Oregon Agricultural College. Prof. E. L. Potter and his assistant, George L. Samson, have rearranged the work so that instead of separate courses in breeding, feeding, judging and like matters, each, including information as to all these animals, the course on horses, for instance, will contain instruction in all these points. Thus the man who is a horse dealer will not have to sit through lectures dealing with rigs and sheep, but can get exactly what he wants. The college farm drives and herds will be used for demonstration and judging during the courses.

In answer to many inquiries as to the progress of the popular government, Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., has compiled the following information: Initiative and referendum amendments have been adopted in South Dakota, Oregon, Oklahoma, Colorado, Nevada, Missouri, Montana, Arkansas, Maine and California. Initiative and referendum amendments have been endorsed by legislatures for submission to a vote of the people in Washington, Wyoming, North Dakota, Nebraska, Florida, Idaho and Wisconsin. The Oregon plan of popular election of United States senators has been adopted in Oregon, Nebraska, Nevada, Minnesota, New Jersey, Ohio, Kansas, California and Wisconsin. The states which have adopted the Oregon plan of popular vote for candidates for party nomination for president and vice-president, with the dates on which the primary votes will be had are: North Dakota, March 19; Wisconsin, April 2; Nebraska, April 17; Oregon, April 19; New Jersey, May 28.

## Produced New Potato

A new potato—one that is destined to be a record producer on dry land, or land without irrigation, and incidentally lead the world when it comes to quality, is the product that has been procured by D. M. Brvan and his sister, Mrs. Helen Sherman, of Clover Flat. The work of propagation has taken the last six years and the potato is proven to be a heavy producer on unirrigated lands, and is distinct from any of the ordinary tubers so they have named it the Lake County Beauty, and it does not belie the name in any manner, for it is a beauty in every sense of the word. This year they planted their crop of late potatoes on June 20 as an experiment, and the crop is as good as any one could expect, being large, well developed and free from scale. It is nothing unusual to find specimens that weigh upwards of one pound each and many have gone much above that mark. Mr. Brvan has also experimented largely with various kinds of grasses and has found that a variety called "Tall Meadow Oat" is one of the best varieties for unirrigated lands, especially where the soil is of a light sandy loam or heavier loam. He has many other varieties that appeal to him in the grass line, but the above does the best on the unirrigated lands and is a sure producer. He has a fine homestead where he is living, and has had foresight to purchase every acre of available land for sale in his vicinity.

## Move the State Line

Land is sure becoming more valuable in Lake County if the following episode is a criterion of values: It seems that in making a survey of some land on the West Side years ago, in the immediate vicinity of the Oregon-California line, a mistake was made in chaining out the distances and a certain resident of the county a short time since ran his own lines by the aid of a chain. He found the measurements of the old survey varying somewhat and when he looked the matter over thoroughly, found that a part of the land that he claimed was across the line in California. The matter worried him a lot and one night while lying awake thinking the matter over, a brilliant idea struck him and he proceeded next morning to put it into practice. He wrote to the Governors of the two states mentioned to see if he could have the state line changed. The answer was that the line was to about the same.
