**Incendiary Blaze**  
Alturas New Era: Tuesday night an apparent attempt at incendiarism was committed in Alturas, the buildings which the culprit was trying to burn being the Raker and Gleason buildings, just south of the river. # STATE CONVICTS TO BE EDUCATED

Salem, Nov. 15.—"No education no parole." will be the dictum of the State Parole Board if it follows the recommendation of a committee consisting of Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman, Superintendent James, of the State Penitentiary; Rev. P. E. Bauer, State Parole Officer, and Father Moore, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, of this city, and one of the chaplains of the Penitentiary. The committee met today in the office of Mr. Alderman and formulated a course of study for the convicts at the prison.  
This course of study is wide in its range and while giving some branches which will tend toward developing a patriotic spirit, such as American history, it largely leans towards the practical.  
The recommendation which will be made to the Parole Board, and which undoubtedly will be acted upon by that Board, will be a compulsory course along educational lines of the convicts who are serving under the indeterminate sentence law, and unless these convicts pass in their examinations their applications for parole will be rejected until such time as they show themselves properly prepared to leave the prison.  
Special stress will be laid on branches in cookery, agriculture, horticulture, country raising and use of gas and gasoline engines. All of these courses will be for the purpose of furnishing the convicts with a practical education which will be beneficial to them when they leave the prison.  
Those who are allowed to eat at the "first table" or, that is, those convicts who have evinced a desire to learn good table manners, will be instructed in cookery and the course will be one tending to place them in a position so that they will prove competent chefs and be able to secure employment in restaurants or in private families.  
These branches will be supplemented by the three R's and will go along with English, literature and the various common school branches of which many of the convicts may have been deprived in their earlier years.  
The instruction will be through volunteers and an urgent call has gone forth from the committee for volunteer teachers from Salem to spend a certain length of time each week at this work.
