## BACK TO THE SOIL HANLEY'S PLAIN

Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 3.—"Since the Western Governor's special left St. Paul it has attracted more attention than anyone from the West could realize," said William Hanley, of the Oregon delegation, with the special here tonight. "The East is anxious and makes its pilgrim brother welcome in all the cities we have visited."  
"The Governors have been hard worked as they have been in great demand. The Commercial organizations in the different cities have made extensive arrangements to entertain the Western Governors, who have represented with credit their states and have fully compensated them with well condensed information which Eastern people were eager to know something about, as they are all feeling that the price of living has gone so high that they might be able to give them some facts that they might get it reduced without losing some of their people from the tilling of the soil.

"The Great Northern exhibit cars of the Governor's special have been visited by many thousands of people at each of the cities where stops were made. "The visitors were of all classes, many young men with their wives, working for wages, are very anxious to get West and build themselves up a home in the country, but as a general rule they are all feeling that it is a hard undertaking to make the break from a monthly income, barely sufficient to live on, to move and take up a piece of land and stay with it until they have a product from it sufficient to live on."  
"Going from one city to another I find each one specialized in some particular factory product, and I also find the people generally a community localized to their own locality, to their own factory product. They do not seem to realize to the fullest extent their interest in building up the source from which their business comes—the soil.

"The greatest good that can be done to all these communities would be if they could get a popular craze of going out with their commercial organizations in special trains, the same as the Western Governor's special, studying conditions for themselves. As it is in my judgment, the minds of the people are far behind the real development of a country. They take too much food of thought that a trust or something else is pinching them than in the real cause of the lack of their interest to look out for the development of their own country, to their farthest neighbor in the West."

brush better than that that has? The best thing for tender foot to do is to leave this class for the man that knows what he is doing.

Is there good land to be purchased at a low cost in Lake County? Plenty of it and now is the time to buy, not after there are thousands more people here.

Do you expect Lake County to grow? It should double its population within the next few years.

Is that not nothing it pretty strong? A jump of five thousand in population in three years with the wonderful resources and the railroads coming is not out of the question. It will take concerted action on the part of every one but can be easily done.

How large is Lake County? Nearly as large as the combined states of Connecticut, Rhode Island and Delaware.

Are there any business openings?

Yes lots of them in the new towns that are springing up in various sections. What is the greatest need of Lake County? People.  
What kind of people are desired? Farmers and actual settlers to take up lands and till the soil.  
Can a man purchase supplies from local merchants? The stores of the various towns carry a general stock good enough for any one and capable of meeting all needs.

What are horses worth. From \$30 to \$300 according to the stock.  
Do bees do well and is there forage for them? Yes. If the honey grown here is a fair index this is a favored place for them.

What is wages for common labor? Laboring men get from \$2 to \$3 per day according to what it is and demand at certain times of the year.

Is there much wind at Lakeview? Compared with some places in the West it is so still here that a person needs a bellows to help them draw their breath, but seriously speaking there is seldom any wind that is more than ten to fifteen miles per hour.

Does hog raising pay there? Yes any where else in Oregon, not to mention Lake County.

Is there much alfalfa grown about Lakeview? Not compared to the possibilities in this line. There is room here for hundreds of alfalfa growers and alfalfa seed raisers.

Do you think there will be plenty of work in Lakeview next Spring? Looking into the future will say that the prospects of the future were never brighter for labor here than they look at this time with the many improvements contemplated next year.

**FAST AND BEAUTIFUL WILL BE THE NEW "SUNSET" TRAINS**

Southern Pacific "Sunset Route" will cut time between New Orleans and San Francisco thirty hours and connect with steamships for New York—Cars built of steel and of the latest design

**PREVIOUS RECORDS TO BE BROKEN**

Service on the "Sunset Limited" will begin December 4th from New Orleans and the following day from San Francisco. The trains will leave New Orleans at 12:30 noon Mondays and Thursdays of each week and arrive in Los Angeles at 9:15 p. m. every Wednesday and Saturday and in San Francisco at 11:00 a. m. the following days.

On the Eastern trip trains will leave San Francisco at 6:30 p. m. Tuesdays and Saturdays, Los Angeles at 8:30 a. m. the following days and arrive in New Orleans at 7:20 p. m. every Friday and Tuesday, thus cutting the running time between San Francisco and New Orleans to seventy hours and fifty minutes.

**BUILT FOR HIGH SPEED**

The trains will consist of only six cars and thus the high speed that will be demanded to make the schedule may be maintained with comparative ease.

Each train will carry only a dynamo and baggage car, a diner, three drawing-room sleepers and an observation car. The sleeping and drawing-room cars will be finished in mahogany and other beautiful hardwoods and furnished in luxurious fashion. The sleeping cars will each contain ten sections, two compartments and a drawing-room. They are being built with special regard to the comfort of women and the accommodations for them will be most commodious. A ladies' maid, manicure and hairdresser will all in caring for the needs of women.

The men will also be well taken care of, there being a barber, shower bath, arrangements for pressing clothes and a stenographer aboard.

Berths are to be electric lighted, both upper and lower and electric fans will cool the air of the car.

The dust and dirt of trans-continental travel will be eliminated by the installation of vacuum cleaners that will do away with the offensive brushing up of the dirt in the cars. At all terminals, trains will be given telephone connections and travelers will be enabled to talk with friends in the city without leaving the cars.

The luxuries afforded the traveler and the speed attained are such that an excess fare of Ten Dollars will be charged between the two terminals.
