## CHANGE OF MAILS NOW PLANNED FOR

Efforts Being Made to Transfer Contract to Railroad Quickly

W. A. Dunaway, superintendent of the N.-C.-O., during his stay in Lakeview Sunday, announced that he would at once take up with the Postoffice department the question of carrying the mails between Davis Creek and Lakeview. He expressed his disappointment at the delay following the change of terminus from Alturas to Davis Creek, and stated that he would do all in his power to avoid a similar occurrence when Lakeview is made the terminus next month.

Mr. Dunaway stated that he would first take the matter up with the division superintendent at San Francisco, and by that means expected to have the change made at an early date. However, there is just about so much red tape in cases of this kind, and if the mails are brought through on the train before a month after the change is made the Examiner will present Mr. Dunaway a bottle of wine.

Postmaster Ahlstrom has also taken up with the postoffice department the question of carrying the mails by rail after January 9. He will endeavor to avoid a delay similar to that experienced when the railroad terminus was changed from Alturas to Davis Creek. Mr. Ahlstrom is of the opinion that after regular train service is established to Lakeview that but very few days will pass ere the mail is carried by train and the Southern stage route will be numbered among the things that have been.

### New Transfer Business

R. M. Boller, recently of Klamath Falls, arrived here Monday evening and will cast his lot with Lakeview. Mr. Boller has been engaged in the truck and transfer business for several years past and will engage in the same line of business here. He brought with him several teams and wagons, but was unable to bring all his outfit at one trip and has started his teams back for the remainder. He will be ready for business in a few days, and will have everything in readiness by the time train service is established next month. In addition to his truck and express business he has two passenger busses and will be able to transfer passengers to all parts of the city.

## WM. HANLEY STILL IN THE LIMELIGHT

Prominent Oregonian Mistaken for William Jennings Bryan

The Governor's special train which has been touring the Eastern states during the past two weeks has met with wonderful success. It has been greeted by immense throngs at all points and has awakened much interest among the people generally. In addition to sample products of the Northwest which are displayed on the train scenes are displayed by means of pictures at the different cities visited.

An amusing incident occurred during the presentation of the pictures. The Toledo audience was unable to recognize any of the notables shown on the motion picture until the striking double of William Jennings Bryan was seen to step down from the observation platform. Then there was an outburst of applause, and just as spontaneously a voice from one of the Governors boxes broke the silence with, "Ladies and Gentlemen, Colonel Bill Hanley, the William Jennings Bryan of Oregon." The house was dark, but a flash from a spotlight directed upon the distinguished figure of the Nebraskan's counterpart on one of the lower boxes, brought forth loud cries of "There he is."

Colonel Hanley's modesty gave way to the humor of the situation and while the stream of white light was still turned upon him, turned his broad, good-natured smile toward the sea of faces with sparkling eyes riveted upon him. It was Bryan's smile, too, and there were many in the audience who insisted that the "Boy Orator of the Platte" was present.

The Northwestern Governors were overjoyed when the harvest scenes typical of the Red River Valley in Minnesota and North Dakota and the apple orchards in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana appeared before them and the applause, which started in the boxes was generously taken up by the audience. Some one shouted, "What's the matter with the Golden West?" Whereupon big Governor Hawley of Idaho stood up waving his broad brimmed hat and answered, "It's the land of Plenty, ladies and gentlemen, and the setting sun beckons you to come." Whereupon a member of the Spanish athletes sang "Montana," which catchy refrain was taken up in chorus generally. It was a big time in the old town of Toledo for the Western Governors.

## R.R. WAREHOUSE TO BE BUILT AT ONCE

Carpenters Will Arrive This Week to Commence Work

Geo. S. Oliver, chief engineer of the N.-C.-O., has had a force of men at work this week laying off the denot grounds, sidetracks, etc., at the station at the foot of Center street. A force of carpenters will be in this week to commence on the warehouse and the material has already commenced arriving. Work on the passenger denot will not be commenced until the weather becomes good in the Spring, and the freight warehouse will be used for all purposes until it is completed.

### Specialized Industry

In spite, however, of the natural handicap trading by the farmers has become very extensive. The farmer no longer individually makes his own shelter, his own clothes or a large part of the food he consumes. Transportation facilities have overcome his trade isolation, and now it is a question whether he shall produce merely a surplus for the market, or shall make a market crop and purchase with the proceeds an increasing proportion of his food requirements. Like dairying, cattle breeding and feeding involves considerable general farming in growing a line of feeds, yet the cattlemaster is naturally a specialist, and it is frequently noted that the owner of great herds of cattle buys his milk and butter the same as the milk dairyman buys his butter. Here some economic exchange is easier and pays better than adding another item toward production.

The poultry business is rapidly going into the hands of those who do nothing else, and are skimming the cream off the markets. Poultry-keepers make little pretense of raising their feeds and do no general farming. Although apparently a small matter, poultry is very exacting in its requirement of business system and does not tolerate divided attention. Bee-keeping and fruit growing more and more seem to require all the labor, capital and management of their respective followers. Both are less and less features of general farming. The markets require more and better honey and fruit, but it is the expert producer who must supply the demand.

Trucking, the great original and typical specialized farming industry, is rapidly extending. However, many truckers, do not pay what attention they should to a proper rotation of truck crops, owing largely to want of capital.
