TOM LAWSON LIKES CENTRAL OREGON

Bend, Oregon, Dec. 8.—Cultivated by Central Oregon, but having reached the age where he cannot leave Boston, Tom Lawson, the noted financier and author, has sent his son-in-law to build in Crook county another Dreamworld. Four hundred acres of rich bottom land on Crooked river has been purchased by Henry McCall of Thomas Sharp, Jr., for \$30,000, and Mr. McCall is preparing to make it one of the finest ranches in Oregon. The land was bought in the fall being then in a raw state. With a large gasoline engine as motive power, the land has been plowed and a crop put in. Next summer it will be seeded to alfalfa. The land is irrigated by a ditch, but Mr. McCall's plan is to use his tractor to pump water instead of employing the gravity method.

Mr. McCall and wife will make their home on the farm having under construction now a residence that will cost \$14,000. Mr. Lawson visited Central Oregon in July last, when he was a guest for several weeks of Tom Sharp, and it was through him that McCall came to purchase the 400 acres and come to Oregon to live.

In the matter of the appointment of a Constable for Fort Rock precinct No. 14, of Lake County, Oregon, a petition having been filed with this court signed by 31 resident citizens of Fort Rock precinct, requesting that Mr. H. A. Chapman be appointed to that office.

It is hereby ordered that Mr. H. A. Chapman be and he is hereby appointed as Constable for Fort Rock, Precinct No. 14, of Lake County, Oregon.

In the matter of the Local Option election in Silver Lake, Summer Lake, Paisley, Fort Rock, and Lake Precincts, in Lake County, Oregon.

Now at this time the above entitled matter coming on for hearing and it appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that upon a petition duly filed an order of the Court was made for an election to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquor should be prohibited in the above named precincts that said election was duly held on the 7th day of November, 1911; that on the 13th day of November, 1911, the returns of said election were duly canvassed by F. W. Payne, County Clerk and G. H. Aldridge and William Wallace, Justices of the Peace of Lake County, Oregon, and that said returns show a majority vote in the entire district above named to have been against prohibition and that the precincts of Silver Lake, Summer Lake, Paisley, and Lake each show a majority vote against prohibition and it further appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that on the 12th day of June, 1908, pursuant to an election held within the territory embraced within the above mentioned precincts, this Court made an order prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor in said precincts, it is hereby considered, ordered and adjudged that the order of prohibition made as aforesaid on the 12th day of June, 1908, be and the same hereby is set aside and held for naught as to the following named and described precincts to-wit:

Silver Lake precinct No. 1 in Lake

County, Oregon, which is described as follows:—Beginning at the northwest corner of T. 27S., R. 12E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence East 18 miles, thence north 12 miles, thence east 3 miles, thence north 9 miles, thence west 3 miles, thence north 6 miles, thence west 24 miles to place of beginning.

Summer Lake precinct No. 2 in Lake County, Oregon, which is described as follows:—Beginning at the SE corner of T. 32S., R. 14E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence north 12 miles, thence east 6 miles, thence north 9 miles, thence east to County line, thence south 9 miles, thence west to the northeast corner of T. 31S., R. 22E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence south 6 miles, thence west 36 miles to place of beginning.

Paisley precinct No. 3, in Lake County, Oregon, which is described as follows:—Beginning at the northwest corner of T. 33S., R. 16E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence east to the northeast corner of T. 33S., R. 29E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence south 6 miles, thence west 5 miles, thence south 6 miles, thence west 1 mile, thence south 12 miles, thence west to the southwest corner of T. 33S., R. 16E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence north to place of beginning.

Lake precinct No. 13, in Lake County, Oregon, which is described as follows:—Beginning at the northeast corner of Lake County, Oregon, thence running west along the north boundary line of said county to the northeast corner of township 23 S., R. 16E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence south to the range line between ranges 16 and 17 E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence west on the township line between townships 25 and 26 S., to the northeast corner of T. 26S., R. 15E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence east on the boundary line between townships 27 and 28 S., a distance of 3 miles, thence south on the section line a distance of 9 miles, thence east on the section line to the east boundary line of Lake County, Oregon, thence north on the east boundary line of Lake County, Oregon to place of beginning.

And it further appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that in Fort Rock precinct a majority of the votes cast were for prohibition, it is considered, ordered and adjudged that said prohibition order of June 12, 1908, be and the same is hereby continued in full force as to said Fort Rock precinct No. 14, which is described as follows:—

Beginning at the northeast corner of Lake County, Oregon, thence running east along the north boundary line of said county to the northeast corner of T. 23S., R. 16E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence south on the range line between ranges 16 and 17 E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence west on the township line between Tns. 25 and 26 to the northeast corner of T. 26S., R. 15E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence south on range line between ranges 15 and 16 E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence west on the township line between Tns. 26 and 27 to the west boundary line of Lake County, Oregon, thence north along the west boundary line of said county to place of beginning.

Done in open Court November 14, 1911.

Thereupon Court adjourned to meet Wednesday, Nov. 15, 1911 at 9 o'clock a. m.

This matter coming on regularly to be heard at this time to canvass the votes cast at an election held October 10th, 1911, to determine whether or not an unincorporated portion of Lake County, Oregon; hereinafter described should be incorporated as a municipal corporation under the general laws of the State of Oregon, and it appearing to the satisfaction of this Court from the proof of publication on file herein, that the notice of such election therefor given by the order of this court was duly and regularly published for the period of two weeks prior to the date of such election in the Chewaucan Press, a newspaper of general circulation printed and published weekly at

and within the proposed limit of said corporation as described in the order for publication and the returns for such election having been duly presented to this court for canvass, the court did on the first Wednesday of its next regular term after such election, to-wit, on the first day of November, 1911, proceed to canvass the votes cast at such election, which said proceeding of canvassing the votes cast at such election was thereafter continued to and until the 6th day of November, 1911 and again thereafter continued to and until the 13th day of November, 1911 and upon a completed canvass of said votes it appearing to the satisfaction of the court that a majority of the votes cast at such election were for incorporation.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered, adjudged and declared that the following described territory is duly incorporated as a municipal corporation under the name and style of the Town of Paisley.

Starting at the SW corner of Section 24, T. 33S. R. 18E., W. 1/2, sec. 36, thence running north to the south bank of the Chewaucan river, thence following the meander of the south bank of said river in an easterly direction to the dividing line between the N. and the S. 1/2 of said section 24, thence running east to the NE corner of the NW 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of said section 24, thence east 500 feet, thence running south one half mile to the section line between Sections 24 and 25, in said Township and range, thence running west to the SW corner of said section 24, thence running east to place of beginning, and it further appearing to the Court that the following named persons received the highest number of votes cast at said election for the respective offices as follows:

FAST AND BEAUTIFUL WILL BE THE NEW "SUNSET" TRAINS

Southern Pacific "Sunset Route" will cut time between New Orleans and San Francisco thirty hours and connect with steamships for New York—Cars built of steel and of the latest design

PREVIOUS RECORDS TO BE BROKEN

Service on the "Sunset Limited" will begin December 4th from New Orleans and the following day from San Francisco. The trains will leave New Orleans at 12:30 noon Mondays and Thursdays of each week and arrive in Los Angeles at 9:15 p. m. every Wednesday and Saturday and in San Francisco at 11:00 a. m. the following days.

On the Eastern trip trains will leave San Francisco at 6:30 p. m. Tuesdays and Saturdays, Los Angeles at 8:30 a. m. the following days and arrive in New Orleans at 7:20 p. m. every Friday and Tuesday, thus cutting the running time between San Francisco and New Orleans to seventy hours and fifty minutes.

BUILT FOR HIGH SPEED

The trains will consist of only six cars and thus the high speed that will be demanded to make the schedule may be maintained with comparative ease.

Each train will carry only a dining car, a diner, three drawing-room sleepers and an observation car. The sleeping and drawing-room cars will be finished in mahogany and other beautiful hardwoods and furnished in luxurious fashion. The sleeping cars will each contain ten sections, two compartments and a drawing-room. They are being built with special regard to the comfort of women and the accommodations for them will be most commodious. A ladies' maid, manicure and hairdresser will aid in serving for the needs of women.

The men will also be well taken care of, there being a barber, shower bath, arrangements for pressing clothes and a stenographer aboard.

Berths are to be electric lighted, both upper and lower and electric fans will cool the air of the car.

The dust and dirt of trans-continental travel will be eliminated by the installation of vacuum cleaners that will do away with the offensive brushing up of the dirt in the cars. At all terminals, trains will be given telephone connections and travelers will be enabled to talk with friends in the city without leaving the cars.

The luxuries afforded the traveler and the speed attained are such that an excess fare of Ten Dollars will be charged between the two terminals.
