## County Court Proceedings

(Continued from last week)

It is further ordered, adjudged and declared that the following named persons are duly elected as officers of the town of Paisley: For Mayor—C. E. Campbell, for Aldermen—R. B. Jackson, V. Conn, M. C. Currier, R. J. Brattain, V. O. Morgan, B. F. Cannon. For Recorder—A. A. Farrow. For Marshal, A. G. Clarkson. For Treasurer—Geo. Park.

Dated and done in open court this 13th day of November, 1911.

In the County Court of the State of Oregon: for the County of Lake. Wednesday, Nov. 15, 1911.

Court convened pursuant to adjournment of Nov. 14, 1911, the same officers being present, when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of the road petition for a County Road in road District No. 10, Lake County, Oregon, and it appearing to this court that notice was given as required by section 6280, Lords Oregon Laws for more than 30 days previous to the 1st day of November, 1911, notifying all persons that application would be made to this court at its next session, to-wit—on November 1st, 1911, to locate and construct a county road in Lake County, Oregon, as follows:

Beginning at a point in the County road at the quarter corner between sections 14 and 15, Td. 39S., R 19 E., W.M. thence running south between said sections 14 and 15 and also between sections 22 and 23 to the section corner common to section 22, 23, 26 and 27 in said Townships and ranges to the present county road. Also, beginning at a point in the present county road 1/2 mile east of the quarter corner between sections 17 and 18, Td. 40S., R. 17E., W.M. thence running south to the SE corner of the SW 1/4 Sec. 20, said township and range to the present county road. Also beginning at the NW corner of Sec. 29, Td. 40S., R. 19E., W.M. at a point in present county road, thence running south between Section 29 and 30 in Td. 40S., R. 19E., W.M. thence continuing south between sections 31 and 32 said township and range, thence continuing south between section 7 and 8, and between sections 17 and 18, and between sections 19 and 20, Td. 41S., R. 19 E., W.M. to the state line between California and Oregon.

And no objections having been made to the granting of said petition it is hereby ordered that Mr. S. A. Mushen, County Surveyor of said County, R. A. Paxton and Creed Pendleton, as viewers, be and they are hereby appointed to view, survey and report to this Court, as provided by law, their findings as to the said proposed County Road, and they are further directed to meet at the Court House in Lakeview, Oregon on the 1st day of November, 1911, at the hour of 9 o'clock, a. m. of said day, or upon their failure to meet within five days thereafter and then and there and qualify and immediately thereafter to view, survey and report upon said proposed road, as above described. The report of F. W. Payne, County Clerk, showing that, from Oct. 1, 1911 to Nov. 1, 1911, he had issued warrants amounting to \$402.00 in payment of bounty on 252 coyotes and 12 bobcats, was examined, found to be correct, and the seals and feet destroyed according to law.

The books of F. W. Payne, County Clerk, and F. O. Ahlstrom, County Treasurer, were examined on this date and found to be correct.

Thereupon Court adjourned to meet Nov. 16, 1911 at 9 o'clock a. m.

## OREGON POTATOES IN GREAT DEMAND

Klamath County Chronicle: The Klamath Valley Warehouse company has shipped another carload of potatoes to Ashland, this being the second to go to that city. The demand for Klamath county potatoes is constantly increasing and the indications are that next year will see a big market for spuds from this locality.

Claude H. Daggett, a manager of the local concern, stated yesterday that it will be a easy matter to dispose of potatoes from this county, provided that white potatoes are grown. There is no market to the south for the blue skinned variety, these having to be disposed of in the valleys to the west of here.

If white potatoes are raised they can be shipped south and easily compete with those grown in the Sacramento valley. Already the reputation of the potatoes that are grown here is spreading and if a special effort is made this city should become one of the big shippers of potatoes in the state.

## NO HOPE FOR THE MANCHUS

Shanghai, Dec. 19.—Promise of peace in China became more definite today with the announcement that all six of the great powers—Japan, Great Britain, the United States, Russia, France and Germany—are united in a co-ordinated effort to assist Dr. Wu Ting Fang and Tang Shao Yi in their negotiations.

There was rejoicing when it was learned that the representatives of the six powers were preparing formally to offer their assistance for the speedy conclusion of an understanding.

It is clearly understood that this action by the powers is taken in the most friendly manner.

The four powers between Wu Ting Fang and Tang Shao Yi passed with surprising smoothness and there is a complete absence of any strain which might have seriously impeded the diplomatic progress of the conference.

It is unmistakably evident, however, that the continuation of the Manchu rule, even as concerns of the imperial throne at Peking, is considered unlikely by either side. In this connection much significance is attached to the statement of Tang Shao Yi; that he does not represent the throne but rather the premier. Coupled with Wu Ting Fang's early insistence on the establishment of a republic this is taken to mean that Yuan Shi Kai is prepared to concede the ending of the dynasty.

Even though the present dynasty is ousted the premier evidently hopes to retain the imperial form of government, possibly the present Emperor designated as the first ruler of a new Chinese dynasty and with Yuan Shi Kai as regent.

The personality of Yuan Shi Kai dominates the convention. The great fight among the delegates will be as to whether the form of government is to be imperial or republican. If an empero, Yuan will be regent. If a republic, Yuan will be the first president.

The revolutionary delegates believe that they will be victorious in their demands for a republic. Even the staunchest of the imperialist delegates admit that Manchu rule is doomed.

The meeting has brought from the north many bureaucratic Chinese, who after twenty four hours in Shanghai, express astonishment at conditions south of the Yangtze.

Tang Shao Yi's delegates evidently are impressed with the widespread demand for a republic, but they still hope that the combined authority of Tang Shao Yi and Yuan Shi Kai will prevail. The action of the powers undoubtedly will have weight in the negotiations.

Comment has been aroused by the prominence of persons of British nationality, both officers and others, in connection with the conference and the journey from Peking to the south of Tang Shao Yi. Both at Shanghai and at Hankow the British consul met the boat on which Tang Shao Yi was traveling down the Yangtze. Notwithstanding that Tang Shao Yi landed at the French settlement, the British consul here took a leading part in this reception and persuaded him to take up his residence in his private house.

The British authorities also provided a guard for the house in which Tang Shao Yi is residing and are assuming the responsibility for all the arrangements made for him during his stay. Tang Shao Yi's host sees all visitors calling at the house and acts as a censor of all communications sent to or issued by Tang Shao Yi.

That it places an unnecessary burden of expense upon the owners of property and the former law providing for the collection of taxes, which relieves the taxpayers from the expense of publication should be re-enacted.
