RUSSIAN TREATY TO BE ABROGATED

Washington, Dec. 19.—The senate today, after a debate lasting for six hours, adopted by a vote of 72 to 0 the Lodge substitute for the Sulzer resolution calling for abrogation of the treaty with Russia because of the refusal of the czar's government to honor passport held by American citizen of Jewish birth.

This vote ratified the action taken by President Taft in notifying Russia of a desire on the part of the United States government to abrogate the treaty of 1832.

By a vote of 45 to 16 the senate rejected the Hitchcock substitute, which was only a modification of the language of the resolution.

A further substitute, differing only in the language employed and offered by Senator Newlands, was rejected without a record of the vote.

The Death Rate

The Oregon State Board of Health has issued a bulletin for the purpose of calling attention to the incompleteness of vital statistics in the state. The mortality rate as shown by the reports received by the board is only 7.7 per thousand, "but does not indicate that approximately one fourth of the death certificates," the bulletin says, "despite our laws, are not reported to this office."

Unusual discrepancies in several counties are pointed out and continuing the bulletin says: "On the other hand, the returns from Gilliam, Malheur and Crook counties preposterous showing that little or no attempt is being made to comply with the law."

The relative number of births and deaths for 1910, was reported to the board from this county, were: deaths, 1; births, 92. The death rate per 1000 population is thus shown to be 27. In July, one death was reported from

Crook county, in August one birth and in September two births. The number of marriages reported were: July, 11; August, 7; September, 7.
