Klamath Chronicle: Old Ike Davies is still staving with his friend Dave Shook, on the Shook ranch, two miles south of Dairy. Davies has had a mottled career. Coming from his native state of Maine by way of the Isthmus, some thirty odd years age, he lived for years in Nevada; thence migrating to Drews valley, not far from Lakeview, where he invested in a herd of sheep and became a shepherd, making a little money out of the venture. Salem, Ore., Feb. 12.- The state tax committe composed of five members is in session this afternoon considering tax measures to be presented to the voters of the state at the next general election. The committee went into session at 2 o'clock.
