GOOD RAILROAD NEWS FROM SOUTH

Extending Survey of Goose Lake Southern Right of Way

Big Valley Gazette: Engineer Brown, who first made a survey for the Southern Pacific Company through Big Valley, presumably for the Fernly-Lassen road, is, at the present time, at Fall River Mills with a large corps of assistants.

The engineers have been at work on this route, unremittingly, for almost two years, and their presence in Fall River at this time gives credence to opinions of men up in railroad circles, of the feasibility of this route, and of the acceptance by the higher officials.

The surveyors, for the past year, have been working in the vicinity of Millville following the lines surveyed through Pitt River canyon, and from information gained, the engineer is now making a re-survey, after which he will follow The Pitt into Big Valley.

The Goose Lake Southern, rights of way already bought through the fertile Goose Lake Valley, has a permanent survey by way of Alturas, down Pitt River to a point near Lookout; and this with the survey made south from Klamath Falls, by way of Merrill, connecting at Lookout with the Goose Lake Southern, bears out the contention that the proposed road will follow the Pitt River route as near as the survey can be made.

A Southern Pacific Engineer with offices in San Francisco, recently made statement to the effect that the Fernly-Lassen railroad was practically abandoned for the present time, and no immediate action would be taken on that proposed route.

The Southern Pacific and Hill interests will build into this country from the north, and from their present activities Big Valley and the North have most flattering prospects of near future railroad facilities.

FISHER BUYS NEW PINE CREEK RANCH

Will Lease West Side Property and Live On New Place

Last week a very important real estate deal was consummated in this valley when Fred B. Fisher, of the West Side, purchased the Robert McCulley ranch near New Pine Creek. This is the property that Mr. McCulley acquired of the late Thomas W. Cplvin a couple of years ago, and comprises 335 acres of land. The price paid was not given out but no doubt was a good figure as this is considered one of the best tracts in the valley.

Mr. Fisher will move on the ranch about the first of the month and will principally engage in dairying and hog raising. He expects to lease his West Side ranch and will spend all his time on the New Pine Creek place. Mr. McCulley, it is stated, will go to Surprise valley where his brothers are interested in the stock business.

Rights of Way Recorded

Klamath Herald: About thirty of the thirty-five rights of way contracts for the second unit laterals in the reclamation work in the Poe Valley, Nuss Lake and Griffiths lateral region have been approved at Washington and recorded. Project Engineer W. W. Patch of the local project stated that as soon as the other five are sanctioned by the Washington officials advertising for bids for the work would be printed. This work is an important part of that which is planned to be undertaken by the reclamation service here this summer.

MRS. ELY IS NOW IN CALIFORNIA

"Ely Day" Designated in Honor of Dead Aviator

Tomorrow has been designated as "Ely Day" at the Oakland Aviation Field at Emeryville, Cal. The meet has been in progress since Friday of last week and in regard to Mrs. Ely, who is well remembered here, the San Francisco Chronicle of Feb. 19, says:

Mrs. Eugene Ely, widow of the dead aviator, was an interested spectator yesterday afternoon, and was the first to congratulate Miss Scott when she came to the ground after her flight. Mrs. Ely ran to the center of the field and warmly shook the hand of the aviatrix.

Mrs. Ely announced yesterday that she would probably take a flight with Miss Scott or one of the other fliers on "Ely Day," which is to be held next Friday afternoon. Mrs. Ely was the last passenger that her husband took in the air before he met his death while flying at Macon, Ga., four months ago.

The gross receipts of the day will be given Mrs. Ely. That her benefit may be as large as possible, even the officials of the meet have announced that they will purchase tickets to enter the field on Friday afternoon. The aviators have agreed that they will gladly renounce their share of the money taken in at the gates.

William H. Hoff, the former mechanic of Eugene Ely, who was injured at the start of the international race on Saturday afternoon, was reported as greatly improved in his condition last evening. He is at the East Bay Sanatorium, where the attending physicians announce that he has a good chance for recovery.

Damages Quickly Paid

For the purpose of expediting business and getting closer to its customers through its local representatives, the Southern Pacific Company has issued orders to many of its agents at the principal stations along the route giving them authority to settle direct with consignees on ordinary loss and damage claims. At the present time the authority is extended only to certain agents in the more thickly populated territory. Claims for shortage and damage over which there is no dispute and which do not exceed a given amount can now be settled within a day or so after they have been filed with the agent.

Much correspondence is saved and the delay that formerly resulted while the claims were being gone over in the general office of the company at San Francisco is now eliminated.

Bids on Contract

H. H. Riddels, of the Maney Bros. Construction Co., has submitted a bid for building the main canal and ditches of the Northwest Townsite Co.'s Irrigation Project at Paisley. While the amount of Mr. Riddels' bid has not been made public, yet it is known that the work involves an expenditure of approximately a quarter of a million dollars. The work upon which Mr. Riddels' bid does not include the dam, which it is estimated will cost an equal amount.

The company is now considering Mr. Riddels' bid, and if the contract is awarded work will probably commence within the next few weeks. Mr. Riddels has a splendidly equipped outfit and if awarded the contract expects to complete the work in about a year.

With the commencement of work on the project Paisley will be strictly on the map, and its growth and development will be rapid from now on.

Meeting With Success

The Committee appointed by the Lakeview Commercial Club to solicit for the funds necessary to get out folders describing Lake County report a very successful canvass as they found a general feeling of friendliness among the business men whom they saw. They report having encountered a few business men in Lakeview, however, who show hostility toward any movement for the development of their own country.

It is planned to secure 10,000 folders at a cost of about \$650 to \$700, and that amount has been practically provided for with the exception of \$175 which it is hoped can be raised by the subscriptions solicited and the dance to take place Friday evening. A cordial invitation is extended to every one to attend the dance. Tickets include supper which will be given by the ladies of the Civic Improvement Society.

TRACK BALLASTING COMPLETED

N.-C.-O. Line Now Assured of Having Good Roadbed

Despite inclement weather, disadvantages, etc., the N.-C.-O. Railway will today make another score against adversity, when the ballasting of the track along the entire line will be completed. It was doubted by many if this work could be accomplished during the winter months without suspending operation as the ground has been exceedingly soft for some time. During all this work the regular train has not missed a day and has usually been making the run on schedule time.

Now that the road is ballasted Lakeview is assured of continuation of good service and no fear need be entertained about non-arrival of trains. It will be necessary to make some minor repairs along the line for a while but as soon as weather conditions are settled a good road bed will be had.

Agent Cass informs the Examiner that considerable traffic is being hauled over the road and prospects looks favorable for a large volume of business this year. He also states the long distance telephone system is giving excellent service and conversation can be carried on with any point between here and San Francisco. This system is a great advantage to Lakeview and it makes one feel that we had immediate connection with the outside world.

In Explanation

The Examiner is in receipt of an inquiry asking for the location of Center Street in Lakeview. This is rather a difficult explanation to make so it can be understood by the outsider. For the benefit of those unfamiliar with the location of the town, including streets, additions, etc., the Examiner is having a cut prepared, which will be printed in its regular issue in the near future, showing all these details.

Lakeview nestles against the foot hills of the west side of the Warner Range of mountains and the town is located in Sections 15 and 10, township 39, range 20 East Willamette Meridian and covers an area in its city limits of one and one-quarter miles running north and south by one-half mile east and west. Center street is three-fourths of a mile from the south end of the city limits and one-half mile from north end; running east and west past the Court house, which is located 500 feet west of the east end of Center Street. The N.-C.-O. depot is situated at the west terminal of Center street and is approximately one-half mile due west of the Court house.

More Lands Open

A dispatch from Lakeview to the Klamath Press says: The opening homestead entry of a large tract of agricultural lands formerly unsurveyed, is expected to bring many people here in the next few weeks. These lands can be irrigated, though they are capable of producing profitable crops with ordinary tillage and no more than the natural rainfall, which is about 19 inches. The lands are level, free from rocks, good water can be had by digging or drilling wells and an artesian flow is assured those who desire it. One feature is that these lands are near to free fuel and fence posts from the Fremont and Paulina National forests and homesteaders can take either 160 or 320 acres as a homestead and 160 acres additional as a desert entry, making a total acreage that can be filed on of 480 acres.

Fortunate Accident

Klamath Press: Falling in a well 25 feet deep is an experience from which few recover to tell the tale, but true to the indomitable spirit that pervades the "Four Leaf Clover" country, a Bonanza girl suffered such a mishap and is none the worse for it. The young lady is Miss Wave Lindsay. Last night the home of Dr. and Mrs. Ed. Hitchcock at Bonanza was the scene of a merry candy pull, with all of the young people in the community present. Various games were played in the yard and in some way the covering of an old well was partially torn off. In the dark, Miss Lindsay fell down the shaft. There was three and one-half feet of water in the well and it is due to this fact that the young lady escaped injury.

Range conditions on the desert could scarcely be better, the storms of the past week having been all that could be desired by the stockmen.

Discontinues Business

The fire in Lakeview some days ago that destroyed the Willis branch furniture store, along with other buildings of that thriving inland town, has caused the Willis Furniture company to decide to not again open its branch business there. The entire stock of the furniture establishment was destroyed and while it was pretty well covered with insurance, the loss will amount to considerable. It is the intention of the

company to take the money saved from the fire through the insurance and bring it here to add to the already large establishment on Main street. In addition to adding to the furniture stock the company expects to branch out further in the undertaking business. One of the first moves will be to put up a funeral and undertaking chapel in connection with the store and carry a large line of funeral supplies. It is expected to begin work on the new addition for this within a short time.—Klamath Press.
