PROSPECTS NOT BRIGHT

The present outlook for the Republican Representative, whoever he may be, in this Congressional District is not flattering, to say the least. "Jerry" Rusk started a wedge in the Republican ranks with his "Roosevelt and Progressiveness vs. Taft and Standpatism" that will be hard to overcome in the election. Should "Jerry" be defeated at the primary election, he and his followers will no doubt knife the successful candidate to a fare-you-well, and vice versa. It is not to be supposed that had Mr. Rusk seen fit to remain silent on the Presidential question his chances for success would have been in any appreciable degree lessened, while many are of the opinion that by so doing he has greatly weakened himself. Should the Democrats place a strong candidate in the field he will probably be elected, for "harmony" in the Republican ranks seems out of the question since Mr. Rusk has seen fit to draw the line in such marked degree.

Accounts Adjusted

H. S. Adlestein, adjuster of the San Francisco Board of Trade, who was appointed receiver of the Chewaucan Mercantile Company's stock at Paisley this week settled up the accounts in a satisfactory manner to the creditors and departed for his home in Frisco. Ebb Miller, who has been assisting Mr. Adlestein, accompanied him to Lakeview. The company is practically controlled by the original stockholders and it is said to be stronger than it was prior to Mr. Adlestein's adjustment. Mr. Miller has taken an interest in the company and will act as manager in the future. He is well known in Lakeview where he was at one time postmaster, besides having been employed in the mercantile establishments and is a man thoroughly worthy and capable of the position. He returned this week to take charge.

Oregon Trunk Coming

Bend Bulletin: The Oregon Trunk Railway has filed for record with the county clerk at Prineville deeds for right of way and denot grounds in La Pine, 30 miles south of here. When the purchase was made is not known here, but it is presumed that it was a recent transaction.

The right of way is a 100-foot strip across the north half of the northwest quarter and the southwest quarter of the northwest quarter of section 14, township 22 south, range 10 east. Also a town lot and other property were included in the purchase, which was made from the La Pine Townsite Company. This acquiring of property south of here is taken in Bend as an indication that the railway will begin construction of the line south of here at no very distant date.

Prisoner Makes Escape

Monday Sheriff Snider received a dispatch from the authorities at Coalinga, Calif., stating that W. W. Robison was being held there, who it stated agreed to return to Lake County, where he was wanted by the officials, without the form of requisition papers. Snider immediately sent D. T.
